> It was stated at the meeting that state aid was promised last year and A. G. Beals was appointed to wait on the road commission and see what amount of money could be obtained, Frank Taylor and L. M. Kraner were appointed as spokesmen for the delegation at the meeting with the county court in the court house in the afternoon. Mr. Taylor spoke of the need of the road and that the state engineer had designated the Little Nestucca valley as the State Highway and that the delegation requested that \$15,000 be placed in the budget. Mr. Kraner went more fully into the mer-Kraner went more fully into the merits of the Little Nestucca road, and he stated that the taxable value of the property in that vicinity was \$1,250,000, while that of the Three Rivers amounted to only \$30,000. He was not opposed to the improvement of the Three Rivers road, neither was the delegation, but the dairy industry of that part of the county was centered in the Little Nestucca Valley and they were justly entitled to have \$15,000 placed in the budget, for that part of the county needed to be developed. of the county needed to be developed Mr. Kraner displayed the circular pe tition and the map accompanying it. He pointed out that no one in the Little Nestucca valley had signed it, and it was also pointed out that only one business man of Tillamook City had done so., Mr. Kramer contended that if \$100,000 was taken from the road fund and used for hard surfacing

A. G. Beals also made a plea for an appropriation of \$15,000, and called the court's attention to the fact that there were men in the delegation who had resided in the Little Nestucca for 25 years or more, who were the backbone of the county.
