Farm Loan Meeting.

There will be a meeting Saturday, December 2nd, at one o'clock at the South Prairie school house to discuss the different phases of the Government Farm Loan system. This meeting has been requested by several of the farmers of the community and a large attendance is desired. Anyone interested in the subject is invited to attend.

Haberlach and Christensen go East.

Carl Haberlach and F. W. Christensen expect to leave for Toledo and Chicago Friday morning unless the trains are held up. They expect to go to Toledo for two days and stop off at Chicago on the way back. Carl Haberlach says: "That he is particularly anxious to see some of the Chicago buyers. He has sold 1,600 boxes of cheese east. He says Government reports show something like 10,000 boxes cheese more in cold storage on this coast than at this time last year. Besides that we had 3,000 boxes more than last season. Under the circumstances, the only thing that will help us is to get an outlet east for the surplus stock. It means a great deal to us for the next season if we can start out with a clean market next spring. You will remember that two years ago there was a big holdover in the spring and the prices for the whole season were not what they should have been. I am particularly anxious to see more of our stock go East, as the holding are quite heavy on this coast today. We are experiencing some trouble getting cars, but California seems to be getting some shipments away. We expect to see some of the cheese they are making back there and interview some of the buyers as to the stock they may want and how they want it put up. Then Mr. Christensen can see that our cheese makers get the stock in shape to suit the Eastern buyers. I go not look for much future business after the war is over, but our flush make comes on long before Wisconsin's and we should be able to send a lot of cheese back there next spring, even if we get considerable less than present prices. It will mean that we can get some first hand information from Chicago buyers. Several questions are up now in regard to cheese already sold, due mostly to lack of getting cars. It is necessary for us to be alive to the present opportunity and to see and we should be able to send a lot of high priced cheese."

County Court Jottings.

In the matter of the petition of J. J. Hudson for the laying out and establishment of a county road, R. L. Shreve, James Baker and Henry Rogers were appointed a board of road viewers.

In the matter of claims for cattle slaughtered, George Williams was allowed \$25.00, T. R. Wilson was allowed \$50.00; W. H. Kandle was allowed \$12.50; and claim of B. W. Neilson to be taken up Dec. 8.

In the matter of the settlement of the action of the Tillamook Bay Construction Co., an order was made instructing the clerk to draw a warrant for \$2,000.

In the matter of the budget, the court agreed upon the same, which is published on another page. Commissioner McKimins went on record as follows:

"I wish to protest emphatically against the decision made this day to take approximately the sum of \$8,790.00 of the amount of money to be raised for road purposes, in road district No. 1, and expending it in other parts of the county in view of the urgent need of the money for roads and bridges in said district."

In apportioning the road fund, the court gave \$54,000 to road district No. 1 with 72 miles of road; \$64,000 to road district No. 2 with 128 miles of road; and \$54,000 to road district No. 3 with 110 miles of road.

BALKS AT THE "STRING."

Interesting Letter on the Little Nestucca Road Controversy.

Oretown, Nov. 26, 1916.

Editor Headlight.

In your last issue of the Headlight, you say you do not like the "string" tied to the Little Nestucca Road appropriation. To say that the people of the lower Nestucca and Little Nestucca Valley, don't like it, is putting it mild. But when you say we should have a little patience, you surely must mean that for a joke. Does the Editor know, that with the exception of the old Quick road, built into the county from North Yamhill, with State aid, the Little Nestucca Road was the first road built into the county about 36 years ago. We have patience for 36 years, and all this time we have been trying hard to get our just dues from the County Court, but have been systematically discriminated against, and still we are asked to have patience.

We have lived to see the lower Nestucca Valleys develop into the garden spot of Tillamook County. With the exception of the valley surrounding Tillamook City, no other part of Tillamook County compares with it.

In the territory tributary to the Little Nestucca Road, there are eight cheese factories, five saw mills, the town of Cloverdale, numerous schools and churches; the seaside resorts of Neskinow, Woods, Pacific City and Sandlake. A salmon cannery, Cloverdale dock and shipping point. Drying operations are under way working night and day, which, when completed, will reclaim fifteen hundred acres of the finest land in Tillamook County and all this within eight to ten miles of the Sour Grass road. The statement made by the editor that the Little Nestucca road would cost \$150,000 and that three miles of solid rock would have to be cut through, is absolutely false. The facts of the case is, there is a little over seven miles of road to be built from Dolph to the Foster place. Nearly five miles of this road follows the old grade and through meadow land, and will simply have to be widened and rounded up into shape. Instead of about three miles of solid rock to go through, there is only about two hundred yards of rocky points to be cleared out and widened, and the most of this is on the old road. The two miles of new road is almost entirely soft dirt grading.

Thirty thousand dollars is considered a liberal estimate to grade this road 20 feet wide from Sour Grass road to Kandles, better known as the Foster place.

The State Highway Commission has designated the Little Nestucca Route as the State Highway and the people of Yamhill County endorse it, every citizen of Tillamook County, who has the interests of the whole county at heart endorse it. This road will benefit and develop the whole county, the Three River Road does not. If the authors of the circular petition with map, through the aid of the Three River people, think they can switch state aid down Three Rivers, and cut off one third of the county from road work (as is suggested by the map) and use us for feeders of the road hogs man, if they think they can do this, they are smoking a pipe dream in a fool's paradise. The only thing they may accomplish is to destroy further interest in road work by the State Land Commission and Yamhill County. For the information of people in the central and northern part of the county who signed the circular petition, and are evidently unfamiliar with conditions in the south end, I will say that south and west of Cloverdale taxes are paid on an assessed valuation of \$1,252,810, while from Three Rivers store to Dolph there is only \$31,000 of taxable property.

We are justly entitled to \$15,000 for the Little Nestucca road, without any strings attached to it.
