

AUTO GAS FATAL TO ROBERT CORNELL.
Victim Found by Servant Who Goes to Summon Employer to Dinner

Robert Cornell, aged 30 years of 556 East Forty-second Street North, Portland, was asphyxiated with carbon monoxide gas Sunday afternoon while working in his garage with the engine of his automobile running.

Mr. Cornell had gone into the garage to work on his machine late in the afternoon. He took his small child in with him, but about noon took the child to the house and resumed work on the machine. Both the doors and windows were closed in the garage.

About 2 o'clock in the afternoon a servant went to the garage to call Mr. Cornell to dinner. She opened the door of the garage and discovered Mr. Cornell sitting on the running board of the machine. She called to him then shook him, but she got no response. Then she called Mrs. Cornell and several physicians.

A plumbot was used, but all efforts to revive Mr. Cornell proved unavailing. "Petro-mortis," as death from auto gas has been termed, is said by doctors to be extremely sudden.

Mr. Cornell was a member of the firm of Hesse-Martin Iron Works, of East Seventh and Belmont Streets.

Mr. Cornell was well known in Tillamook, his wife, a sister of Mrs. Tom Wise, taught school in Bay City. They were intimate friends of Sheriff Crenshaw and wife and visited here in the summer.

High School Debating.

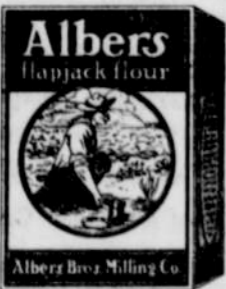
The Tillamook High School is becoming interested in the annual inter-scholastic debates. Tillamook is a member of the State Debating League which comprises 73 high schools. Each year the championship of the state is decided by an eliminating series of intradistrict and inter-district contests, the final debate being held at the State University in May.

Tillamook's first debate will be a three sided contest with Gaston and Forest Grove as opponents. Each school will enter two teams, an affirmative and negative, and the winner will be decided on a scale of points. The date of the first debate is January 12.

Four debaters will be needed to represent the Tillamook High School, and these will be chosen in a series of competitive tryouts. The first tryout will be held Friday evening in the high school auditorium. The question both for the tryouts and the state contests is: "Resolved, that Oregon should adopt a health insurance law, embodying the essential features of the 'Standard Bill' of the American Association of Labor Legislation." The Three Rivers vs. Little Nestucca Road Controversy.

Hebo, December 5, 1916.

To the Editor of the Headlight: I have been reading those bottled up stories from Little Nestucca, and I would like if you would allow me the space to make a reply. Now the only thing that I see is that Little Nestucca has Big Nestucca bottled up, until she can't get to the sea and now we have deep water to Hebo, and the first boat up was the Della, loaded with "hot air" Captain Hardy Rock at the wheel, and when she got as far as Hebo she struck a snag.

Hardy spoke something about building a road 36 years ago. The first time I came to Tillamook was 26 years ago, and I have lived here 20 years, and I have the first road to see, from the Willamette Valley to Tillamook, and I will leave it to anybody's judgment but a siwash if there ever has been one. Now, as there appears a little clear sky ahead and that we stand a chance to get a road, then for pure selfishness, they want to build two, Now Little Nestucca, if you want to act that way it may be 36 years more before we get a road. The Three Rivers road is practically graded, and if you only build one I will leave it to the judgment of any one if it will not come nearer accommodating all of the people of Tillamook County than any other road.

Now bear in mind, that where ever you live in Tillamook County to get out of here, and all from the valley that come in here, must go by the way of the Sour Grass pass, or the railroad. Now don't be so selfish. There are other people in Tillamook beside what live on Three Rivers and Little Nestucca. They said something about being bottled up, and the next breath told about a wharf where ships could land at their back yard, and you may see those Weiss boys, most any day hauling 76 cases of cheese in one auto truck load, and then they say they are bottled up. Now, Little Nestucca, come and go with me up to Blaine, and see if the ships can land in their back yard, and if you can haul 76 cases of cheese at one load, you couldn't get there with an empty truck, and there are two families live at Blaine to one at Little Nestucca. Who's bottled up? The people of Blaine have to travel 50 miles to reach Willamina. Little Nestucca is 37 miles by the way of Cloverdale and Hebo. Now come and go to Sand Lake (if you can get there) if they want to go to the valley how far have they to go to reach Willamina? About 47 miles and you 37 miles. Now come with me to Tillamook City. How far have they got to go? 52 miles, you 37. Who's bottled up? Now come and go to Nehalem. You could leave your home in Little Nestucca the same time they left at Nehalem and travel at the same rate of speed and you would be almost to McMinnville before they got to Hebo. Now who's bottled up? Who furnishes the money to build either road? Where do most of the people live? Then why not build a road that they will get some benefit out of. Now Little Nestucca, what I mean by Little Nestucca is Meda, Oretown, and Neakowin. You have forgotten about how you had to go by Meda over the mountain back of Knoblocks. You have forgotten about that expensive road thrown up across the tide lands, and that expensive steel draw bridge which gives you practically a level road to Tillamook City, and I notice \$13,000 in the budget for roads south of Cloverdale. You will get most of the good out of that. Now Little Nestucca don't lie lengthwise in the trough, get up and square yourself around, and give the other hogs a chance. G. W. Bodifelt tells me that he hasn't been over the Dolph Mts. but once in 15 years. Does all of his trading with his home merchants, and from the looks of his beautiful home and farm he hasn't done so bad by being bottled up. I can't see why Cloverdale takes the part it does in the difference between the two roads, unless she is jealous of her little sister, Hebo. I believe in the religion of good roads, good homes, good food and good clothes.

Now lets get together and build the road that is the easiest to build, cost the least, and will accommodate the most people. And when that is done will go after the others. There can't be too many good roads to suit me.
