

THE BUDGET MEETING.

Timber Men Defeated in Scheme to Divert \$60,000 for Hard Surface

The Court House was packed on Friday afternoon, when County Judge A. M. Hare called the meeting to order to discuss the budget. Large delegations were present from all parts of the county, some of whom were "sore" on account of the poke nose methods of a paid agitator in the employ of some of the timber men, who were present to resent "outsiders" interfering and butting into what is local and county affairs. One feature of the meeting was the strong sentiment in favor of doing justice to Bayocean. Another attempt was made to divert \$10,000 from the appropriation, but the meeting would not stand for it, for it was voted down with an overwhelming sentiment and the "string" was cut which was tied to the \$25,000 appropriation.

No sooner had the meeting started, when a resolution was handed by the timber men to Gus Goeres, which was as follows:

"Whereas there has been much discussion as to whether the county should adopt in principle, the proposition of beginning at this time the building of permanent highways, and, whereas, the budget as published, does not adopt the same principle; be it resolved, that it is the sense of this meeting that the apportionment of the money for road purposes in the several districts be changed to provide that in each district the sum of not less than \$20,000.00 be set aside and used to construct permanent hard-surfaced roads; that the several items providing for repairs and maintenance now in the budget be reduced by the County Court, as its good judgment may dictate, in order to provide the sums needed for such permanent improvements."

This met with little support when it was stated that every appropriation in the road budget would have to be cut down, and when put to a vote the answer was pronounced against the motion.

The budget for district No. 1 was approved without a dissenting vote or even discussion of any of the items.

The budget for road district No. 2, there were only two items that were discussed and voted upon. W. C. Miller asked for an increase in the appropriation for Bewley creek road, as it was necessary to have a better road to the logging camp. Dr. Boals moved that the amount be raised from \$300 to \$2,500, which carried. When the item of \$25,000 for Bayocean road was reached, Guy Vaughn moved that \$10,000 be taken from that amount and used for hard surfacing. Mr. Vincent, representing the Potter Realty Co., and Mr. Mitchell, representing the lot owners, made two strong appeals for a fair deal for Bayocean, and the motion was voted down with a whoop. Another motion was made to eliminate the word "complete" and after a pronounced vote had been cast in favor of doing so, County Judge made the remark "That cuts the string completely in two," so there is no "string" tied to the \$25,000 appropriation. That completed the budget for district No. 2.

There was only one item in road district No. 3 that was attacked, that was \$15,000 for the road from Meda to Sour Grass, which had a "string" tied to it, that if a like amount was not obtained from the state \$10,000 was to be used for hard surfacing. Chas Ray moved that the items for road district No. 3 be approved as published.

A. G. Beals amended this by adding "Federal Aid" to the \$15,000 appropriated for the Little Nestucca road.

Before this was acted upon A. A. Arstall made a motion that \$10,000 of this appropriation be used for a continuation of the hard surface road south of Tillamook City.

Mr. Arstall's motion was out of order but when put to a vote it carried.

Mr. Beal's amendment when put to a vote, carried, as did also Mr. Ray's original motion as amended.

More or less amusement was caused when John Dougal undertook to argue that the Little Nestucca road was not a state highway, basing his argument that there was no county records to show that the road had been designated a state highway. A. G. Beals took issue with Mr. Dougal. He stated that he had run across the foot prints of the silk stocking agitator at Salem when he appeared before the Highway Commission for an appropriation for that road, and he contended that as the Highway Commission had designated the Little Nestucca a state highway, the air splitting argument of the silk stocking agitator did not amount to anything. The audience became a little restive and commenced to hoot and jeer the silk stocking gentleman. After the vote had been taken and the meeting was in doubt as to how the

matter had been decided, Mr. Dougal left his seat in the court house and rushed up to the County Judge and undertook to advise him. The County Judge had not called upon him for advice.

The item of county veterinarian was knocked out as also was that for county library.

S. V. Anderson started a fight on the county agriculturist. He stated that the salary amounted to \$9 a day. He had the support of quite a number of those present, but C. Kunze, Al Bunn and others made a strong plea to retain the county agriculturist, and when the motion was put to a vote it was voted down.

To provide for the \$2,200 raise on the Bewley creek appropriation, Judge Hare re-arranged the budget for road district No. 2 as follows: The Kilchis river to Bay City road was reduced from \$2,000 to \$1,500; the Rupp to Bester road from \$1200 to \$1,000; Red Clover, Creamery road up Trask from \$2,700 to \$2,000; Fairview factory south \$300 struck out; and \$500 was cut from the general repairs.

Pomona Grange Resolutions.

The following resolutions were offered and read from Tillamook Pomona Grange:

"We recommend that the \$500.00 for county veterinarian be cut out of the budget."

"That Pomona Grange go on record as favoring the inclusion in the county budget for road improvement in the ensuing year a sum of at least \$4,000.00, said sum to be spent wholly on extension of new road into Sandlake as at present surveyed."

"The Pomona Grange of Tillamook County oppose the \$2,000 for a county library at Tillamook City, and recommended that it be cut out of the budget."

"Whereas, the Little Nestucca road is the most direct route to the valley and will be of benefit to the largest number of the citizens of Tillamook County; and, whereas, the said road as laid out and surveyed by our county court has been declared a state highway by the State Highway Board, and, whereas, the County Court of Tillamook County has put in the budget the sum of \$15,000 for the improvement of said road, provided that the state shall give aid; therefore, be it resolved by the Pomona Grange of Tillamook County in session at Cloverdale, Ore., this 13th day of December, 1916, that we recommend and endorse the improvement of the Little Nestucca highway and the expenditure of \$15,000 this coming year on said road."

Property Owners Want Justice.

The editor was asked to read the following letter at the budget meeting, but in some way it miscarried and did not reach us until after the meeting was adjourned:

Dear Sir:—Our attention has been called to an effort to divert a part of the \$25,000 appropriated by the County Commissioners for the purpose of completing a short line road into Bayocean and to other sections of the county and as a consequence leaving only sufficient funds to extend the road part way, which means a great disappointment to the residents of Bayocean and likewise means that ultimate cost of the road will be much greater by going at it "piece-meal" than it would be if they appropriated sufficient funds to insure continuous work until fully completed.

We believe, as taxpayers of Tillamook County and residents of Bayocean, and having an investment of approximately \$40,000, that after having paid taxes for nearly 8 years that the residents and property owners of that section are entitled to better treatment than has been accorded them. Outside of the fact that we have improved our property there are hundreds of other people who own lots there fully paid for and a large portion of whom would have built homes and thus increased the taxable revenue had the county provided a highway as promised years ago. The failure to complete a road has discouraged many of these investors and likewise prevented many other persons, who would otherwise have bought property and improved it.

We know of many individuals representing both points of view. We have heard hundreds of individuals express themselves as to the many and varied attractions of Tillamook County and their indifference of the county to the completion of a road that could be used by automobile traffic to the Bayocean property. We believe that both the residents of your county and outsiders who make frequent trips in the summer would welcome this im-

provement and would demonstrate their appreciation in many ways. Considering the amount of money which it would require for this single improvement and the immediate as well as the indirect results which will follow its completion, there is no single method of expending this money which will mean as much to the County at large as this proposed road and its early completion. The favorable action of the County Commissioners on this matter at this time will be nothing more than tardy justice to the property owners of Bayocean regardless of the many benefits which otherwise would follow to the County at large.

We sincerely trust that you will do your utmost in securing a favorable report by the County Commissioners in the expenditure of the entire amount necessary for the completion of this highway.

DRILLED TO PERFECTION.

Secret of the Military Success of "the Madman of the North."

From drill man gets accustomed to doing under any circumstances what has been hammered into his brain time after time till it becomes second nature to him.

Charles XII. of Sweden, "the madman of the north," ripped most of Europe up the back again and again because his soldiers were drilled to perfection before he let them take the field at a time when there was great neglect of drill in other armies. He valued 1,000 well drilled fighters above 10,000 not so well drilled, and madman or genius, his judgment was vindicated repeatedly in terrible battles.

One night Charles XII. was surprised in Poland by an attacking army of 8,000 when his scant force of 600 was sleeping like the dead from the exhaustion of a hard march. Before his outposts and sentinels could be driven in his small band was aroused, mounted, formed in battle line—all in pitchy blackness—and swung into a fierce charge upon the enemy. How Clouds are Colored.

The color of a cloud depends on the manner in which the sunlight falls upon it and the position of the observer. It will be noticed that high clouds are always white or light in color, and this is because the light by which they are seen is reflected from the under surface by the numberless drops of moisture which go to form the cloud. Heavy rain clouds, on the other hand, are found much nearer the earth, and so the light falls on them more directly from above, giving a silver lining to the cloud, though the under surface appears black, owing to the complete reflection and absorption of the light by the upper layers.
