Yamhill County Dispenses with County Agriculturist.

Members of the Yamhill County Taxpayers' League and others in conference with the County Court to discuss the budget for 1917, recommended the elimination of the county roadmaster and county agricultural agent from the appropriation, saving \$4500. GERMANS PROMISE REPLY WITH SWORD.

Cold Steel to be Relied On to Reduce "Fever Temperature" of Enmity.

London, Jan. 2.—Comments of the German papers on the entente reply to the German peace proposals are sent by Reuter's correspondent at Amsterdam as indicating the universal conviction peace now is impossible, and the central powers must continue to prosecute the war with utmost vigor.

The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger considers nobody will be shocked, because the entente's refusal was expected.

"But," it adds, "every one will be surprised and shocked at the shallowness, levity and mendacity of the reasons given for the refusal, and it is difficult to explain how 10 serious men were able to affix their signatures to the document without blushing. Our answer can only be given on the battle field."

Warfare Only Rejoinder.

The Vossische Zeitung says: "All possibility of further negotiations has disappeared under this scornful reply. There is only one rejoinder, namely, warfare until the cold steel of our arms has brought the fever temperature of our enemies down to something near normal."

The Berlin Tageblatt says: "We would gladly have written 'peace be unto thee' over the gate of the new year, but it would be childish to seek in the entente's reply any expressions but those of an absolute 'no.' Who in the world can now doubt that the entente plans, which aim at the dismemberment of Germany, Austria-Hungary and Turkey, will be resolutely repelled by the German people?"

Form of Reply Held Insult.

The Kreuz Zeitung says: "The form of the entente's rejection makes it an insult. Our reply can only be given with the sword." The Rheinisch Westphalische Zeitung says: "The German people, to one man, now will gather around Von Hindenburg. The last plea for indulgence falls to the ground. All our sharp weapons must come into use on the land and sea, and in the air. We know

the points where Great Britain is vulnerable."

The Cologne Gazette's Berlin correspondent considers that no way is left open for further negotiations, and adds:

"It is not improbable that Germany will precisely define the German view direct to the neutrals."

OREGON CHEESE MAKERS ORGANIZE

To Effect Higher Standard of Product and Obtain Better Prices.

About 12 men representing different cheese-factories of Coos and Curry counties, met at the office of County Agent J. L. Smith at Coquille, Oregon, recently and reorganized the Coos and Curry Cheese Association and elected officers for the coming year. The organization was really perfected last spring, but only after the season was so far advanced that it was thought impracticable to put it in operation.

The purpose of the association is to standardize the product of the cheese factories and to improve the selling facilities. In order to do this the association will employ an inspector whose duty it will be to inspect the cheese of the different factories and brand the product according to the class to which it belongs. They will also have a sales agent, and all of the product of the factories belonging to the association will be marketed by him. The by-laws of the association places the maximum cost of inspection and selling at one-fourth cent per pound.

The association is modeled after the one in Tillamook, which has been instrumental in placing the Tillamook cheese above the product of the other Oregon counties. It is estimated that the factories already in the association have an annual output of over 1,500,000 pounds of cheese, and several other factories are expected to join in the near future.

The officers elected were: President J. D. Carls, of Arago; vice-president, A. W. Coke, of Langlois; Secretary-treasurer, A. Christensen. The other members of the board are L. N. Strong, of Two Mile and N. W. McDonald, of Broadbent. Each of the officials are creamery men in the localities in which they live.
