At a recent meeting of the County Court the matter of the Little Nestucca road was taken up and the following resolution was ratified:

"Be it resolved that this Court set apart the sum of \$15,000 of the funds levied upon the funds levied upon the taxrolls of Tillamook County, in the State of Oregon, for the year 1916, which shall be used and expended in the construction of a county road from what is known as the Sour Grass cut off, near Dolph, along the Little Nestucca river by way of Meda in said county, the said sums to be expended in the construction of said road under the direction of the State Highway Engineer of the State of Oregon, or under the direction of the
