Ernest W. Baker who has been a resident of this city for a number of years died at his home on January 20. The deceased had been suffering from tuberculosis, which was the cause of his death. He was married to Florence M. Biggs, Dec. 25th, 1901, in Tillamook County. Four children have been born to this union all of whom survive. Ula M. Iryne W., Una F. and Elma L.

The family residence has been in Tillamook and vicinity all the 15 years, where the husband and wife have labored together to make the living for the little family. About two years ago the disease which proved fatal to his life took hold of him, and he, with his faithful wife, and children have patiently born and fought but had to submit.

Mr. Baker has been a member of the K. P. for 11 years and of the United Artisans for 10 years.
