

\$4,000,000 DEAL IN TIMBER IS CLOSED.

Body Contains 4,500,000,000 Feet, Largely Douglas Fir.

The largest timber deal closed in Oregon in several months was consummated Monday when the Oregon Lumber Company purchased most of the DuBoise Lumber Company's holdings for a consideration understood to be approximately \$4,000,000.

The timber land involved lies in Columbia, Clatsop, Tillamook and Washington counties and embraces about 25,000 acres. The tract cruises about 4,500,000,000 feet of merchantable timber and is said to be one of the finest large bodies in the West. The principal variety is Douglas fir, although there is considerable quantities of spruce, cedar and hemlock.

The purchasing company is owned by the Eccles interests, with headquarters at Ogden, Utah, of which David C. Eccles is the direct head. They have invested several millions of dollars in Oregon timber lands heretofore and are extensive manufacturers of lumber.

Mills at present are operated at Baker, Austin and Whitney, in the Eastern Oregon yellow pine district; at Dee, in the Hood River Valley and at English, in Columbia County, on the Astoria branch of the North Bank Road.

It is understood that the new owners of the DuBois tract contemplate active operations in the near future. Plans for operation would involve the building of logging roads and one or more large mills, either on the Columbia River or on Tillamook Bay. Definite announcement of the company's plans are expected to be made upon the return from Ogden of Charles Early, who is in charge of the Eccles interests in Oregon.

The tract is attractively situated as far as transportation is concerned, being directly accessible to the Astoria branch of the North Bank Road and the Columbia River on the north and the Tillamook branch of the Southern Pacific on the south, in addition to tidewater outlet at Tillamook Bay.

J. K. Gamble, representative of the DuBois interests in Oregon, and Paul C. Bates, of Portland, who acted as intermediary in the deal, accompanied Mr. Early to Ogden, where details of the sale were virtually completed Monday.

Apple Growers' Salesmanager Gets Better Position.

Hood River, Or., Jan. 19.—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Apple Growers' Association Wilmer Seig, appointed sales manager of the old Applegrowers' Union in 1912 and for the four following successive sales manager of the association, announced that at the expiration of his contract on May 1, he contemplated an affiliation with the Earle Fruit Company of the Northwest.

Mr. Seig has been receiving \$6000 a year from the association. It is said that he will receive \$10,000 from the Earle Fruit Company, and that he will hold an interest in the new business.

"I expect to remain in Hood River until May 1," said Mr. Seig this morning, "and clean up the sale of the 1916 apple crop. The new Earle Fruit Company of the Northwest, which will have a capitalization of \$225,000 will be an affiliation of the Earle Fruit Company, of California. We have not settled yet on our headquarters. They will either be at Seattle, Portland or Spokane."

AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

Organizations Perfected to Stop Invading Army of Moles.

The organization for war on moles and gophers in Tillamook County is proceeding very satisfactorily. If success is attained, the united efforts of all the forces in the county must be used. The boys and girls of the schools are becoming enthused at the prospect of making a little money on mole skins. Some of the older people of the communities are turning out at the meetings, but there should be more. What are you doing, dad, to encourage the boys and girls to get after this pest? Come through like some of the others and buy them some traps and give them a bounty of 5 or 10 cents on each mole caught. It is well worth your while to help get rid of these pests.

One father said they had two mole traps but had been unable to get any moles in them. The boys heard the talk at the school and went home and set the traps, and next morning had a mole.

Arrangements are being made to buy the traps in quantities, co-operatively at a considerable saving over retail prices. The pelts will also be held and marketed co-operatively, this insuring a better market and better prices.

In the time Mr. Sheffer could be with us in this county, it was impossible to visit all the schools in the

county. The work will be extended to those schools that were missed, by the County Agriculturist as time will permit.

Cow Test Association Report—First Six Months.

Below are listed the number of cows in the Tillamook Cow Testing Association which have produced 300 lbs. of butterfat in the first 180 days of lactation period. Besides the list, 99 cows in the Association have a record of over 250 lbs. of butter fat in the same period.

The best herd average for the six months is held by Jos Durrer, whose 37 cows averaged 257.12 lbs. fat. This is closely followed by Amos Vaughn with 256 lbs. fat per cow, in a herd of 19, and John Morgan and David Fitzpatrick with 255 lbs. fat in herds of 32 and 22 respectively.

PUBLIC AUCTION Fine Holstein-Friesian Heifers

The Six Registered Holstein-Friesian Heifers that were recently shipped from Wisconsin are now offered at public auction on the farm of Chas. Kunze

Monday, Jan. 29, at 1 p. m.

Three heifers are sired by the bull Julian King of Rock, one of the really good bulls of the Holstein-Friesian breed. His first and only daughter to be put on official test at the age of 21 months has produced the remarkable amount of 20.87 lbs. of butter in 7 days with 520 lbs. milk. Her 30 day record is 86.01 lbs. of butter with 2155.6 lbs. milk, and is being continued in test with about 4000 lbs. milk for 60 days (not yet reported.) The dam has the World's record for the time of 1,021.73 lbs. butter, 17,899 lbs milk as a 3 year old. His sire is Mutual Piebe De Kol who has a splendid list of 27 A. R. O. daughters, 7 of which are young cows and have made from 450 to 767 lbs. butter; a fine showing when we take into consideration that they were tested under varying conditions and by different men and being 1 year and up to 3 years of age. Not one of his daughters have made a poor showing. Mutual Piebe De Kol is also sire of the dams of 5 of these heifers therefore they are double grand daughters of this splendid sire. The dam of the other one is a daughter of Pietirtje Hengervelds Count DeKol who has 99 A. R. O. daughters, a proven sire of transmitting power. Two of these heifers are springers now.
