THE CHEESE SITUATION.
Income Will Aggregate \$728,000 or an Increase of \$200,000.
Regarding the cheese situation, Carl Haberlach makes the following statement:
"After a lull in the market for the past few weeks, due to large cold storage stocks on the Coast, things have commenced to move again. We have sold several car lots to Eastern buyers and also to coast buyers for shipment East. All of the November and considerable of the December stock has been sold. This is on the basis of 20c. Portland and 20c. Tillamook. Wisconsin prices are not very high, but stocks are scarce all through the East. While the entire holdings in the entire country were only 87 per cent as high as a year ago, Northwest holdings were 423.1 per cent compared to last year on January 1st, or four times more. It has taken a stiff upper lip to keep things in hand, as a number of people have been advising to sell and get from under. Personally I have had faith in our position, but many of the farmers have wanted their money. Had we been discouraged, prices undoubtedly would have gone to 18c, or possibly lower. Our production is already beginning to increase, but with the Eastern demand as strong as it is and with their late spring season, much later than ours, we should have good prices for the next three months. Our winter stock is hardly the best to ship East, in fact we have been reluctant about sending cheese made from second and third day milk. Our prices on November butter fat will average around 49c, and I believe that this is much better than the farmers were looking for. December will necessarily be lower, as the yield per lb fat will not be as great as in November.
"Our sales for 1916 will aggregate \$728,000 in value, or \$173,000.00 more than the same factories' product sold for in 1915. The County's increase should be \$200,000."
