





The Alaska Daily Dispatch of Jan 20th, 1917, printed at Juneau, Alaska gives an account of the death of H. W. R. Holmes, formerly of this city by axphyxiation. Mr. Holmes with ive other men was on his way from Juneau to one of the mines on board a boat. They had been engaged to work in one of the mines. The six men came near dying but four of them revived. Another man by the name of Dan Gallahar also died. The men were overcome by poisonous gas while sleeping and their predicament was not discovered until someone went to call them at breakfast time. Mr. Holmes leaves a wife and two children now at Pomona California.
