AY CITY CHARTER KNOCKED

Involves a Large Amount of City Taxes and Bond Issue in Question

The Supreme Court handed down a decision in the case of W. L. Provoost vs. Mary J. Cone which procks out the new charter and ploces Bay City in a peculiar position, for the de-cision involves taxes to the amount of over \$6,000 and brings into question the validity of the bond issue in that city. The city was operating under the general law, and it is the new, or amended charter that goes by the boards. For several years W. S. Cone refused to pay the city taxes, con tending that the charter was defective which proves that he was right in his argument and for two years the Bay City Land Co, has failed to pay the city taxes. This is an appeal by the plaintiff from a decree dismissing a suit instituted to foreclose an alleged delin-quent tax certificate. The question involved is whether the proceedings undertaken to amend a municipal charter were conducted in the manner prescribed. The Town of Bay City manner was incorporated under the provisions of a general act of the legislative as-sembly, filed in the office of the secretary of state February 21, 1893. L. O. L. sections 3206, et seq. Section 3224 thereof contains a clause which reads: "Every ordinance shall be signed by the mayor, or passed over his veto, and attested by the recorder, and a copy thereof published at least once in a newspaper published in such therein before it becomes a law

The cause being at issue was tried, and from the evidence received the court made findings of fact substantially as here stated, and based thereon reduced the conclusion of law that since ordinance No. 3 was never published in a newspaper or posted as required, the substitute charter was not acres, more or less legally enacted, and as it never had life, vitality could not be infused into 1917. it by subsequent amendments, neither of which was affective, and thereupon gave a decree as hereinbefor stated.
