### CLUB MEETING MONDAY

Will Consider Road and Bonding Questions now Before the People

The Tillamook Commercial Club will meet next Monday evening at the Court House for the purpose of considering good roads and the bonding questions now before the people.

The state legislature passed a bill which provides for a \$6,000,000 bond issue to construct a system of highways. Bonds are to carry 4 per cent interest and to be refunded by throwing all automobile license tax into a fund for that purpose. The highway will extend into and through every county of the state, giving Oregon one of the most comprehensive road systems of any of the states under the supervision of the State Highway Commission and State Highway Engineer.

The bill, so we are informed, provides for a hard surfaced road between Tillamook and Cloverdale, but it is also stipulated that the counties are to prepare the road beds where state work is done.

There is also the matter of bonding the county, and this phase of road problems will be discussed.

It is hoped that there will be a large gathering of business men and those interested in good roads, for there is considerable enthusiasm in other parts of the state to obtain state aid, and it behooves Tillamook people to get busy and formulate some plan that is to the best interest of the county as a whole.

The question of bonding the State for \$6,000,000 will be submitted to the people at a special election in June, and until that time no definite arrangements can be made.

### CITY MUST HOLD ELECTION.

To Submit Question of Allowing Pool and Reading Rooms to Open Sundays.

The mandamus proceedings brought by Rollie Watson, Morris Smeal, Eugene Jenkins and 47 other legal voters of Tillamook City to compel the city to call a special election for the purpose of submitting the question to the voters whether pool and reading rooms should be allowed to open Sundays was decided by Judge Bagley in favor of the petitioners, and the city council will have to call a special election as prayed for in the petition.

In a lengthy opinion, Judge Bagley closes by saying:

"In respect to the special election provisions, there is seemingly a conflict between the charter and the ordinance, but an examination shows that in fact that respect they are in harmony. It is expressed in the charter that the council 'may provide for the calling of a special election to vote upon ordinances or charter amendments referred to the legal voters of a city by petition or otherwise,' thus granting the council, at its option, the right to provide for special elections, and that which the council may do thereunder is in harmony with what the council has previously done upon that particular subject; if it has done what it may do and at a time when within its power, in relation to providing for special elections and in the exercise of the power delegated, whether before or after the adoption of the charter, it is not repugnant thereto, and that provision, although mandatory, is nevertheless within the power thus granted. A discretionary power it is true, but within that discretionary power rests the right to make its exercise mandatory or permissive, and it having been made mandatory and not repealed and not in conflict but in harmony with the charter in that respect, is valid and binding until modified."

"Section four of this ordinance provides that the council upon presentation of a petition proposing an ordinance or amendment shall immediately call and order a special election thereon. Here is a power committed to the council for public and not private purposes to be exercised for the benefit of others and it cannot, the words herein quoted being read in conjunction with the text of the ordinance, be construed other than mandatory, imposing an absolute duty and does not as a result of any legal principle even apply an option to exercise discretion or abstain from the doing of the act required. It is a well known principle, legal as well as constitutional, that power granted to public officers for public purposes for the benefit of the public. This being, in the sense used, not permissive by mandatory, there is no discretion on the part of the council in respect to calling a special election, and the duty thus enjoined is one that can be enforced by mandamus."

"It thus appearing from the answer to the writ that the demurrers are well taken, it is ordered that the same be sustained and that a pre-emptory writ of mandamus issue requiring the defendants to call a special election in conformity with the provisions of Ordinance No. 233, read in conjunction with section two, Article VIII of the charter, and to submit the proposed ordinance to the legal voters of the City of Tillamook for adoption or rejection."

The annual stockholder's meeting was held in the Court House, Tillamook City, on Monday the 19th. Meeting called to order by George Williams, President, with the following factories represented.

All of the factories in the association were present and represented except Neskowin.

Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

Shares of stock ordered issued to Oretown, Neskowin, Cloverdale, Meda and Alder Vale.

All stock was declared paid up, there being a surplus in the treasury. Annual report of secretary and Salesman read and accepted.

The zone system of electing the seven directors was thereupon adopted, by which the county was divided into seven districts and not more than one director to be elected from any one zone. Directors elected were: zone one, R. Zweifel, Alder Vale and Mohler; zone two, James Williams, Maple Leaf and Clover Leaf; zone three, Wm. Maxwell, Fairview and Elwood; zone four, George Williams, Tillamook, South Prairie and Long Prairie; zone five, Jay Baker, Pleasant Valley, East Beaver, Beaver and Three Rivers; zone six, M. J. Jenck, Cloverdale, Cold Springs and Central; zone seven, W. H. Christensen, Oretown, Meda and Neskowin factories.

The stockholders adopted the following resolution:

"Be it resolved by the stockholders of Tillamook County Creamery Association, that the directors of said corporation be and they are hereby authorized and directed to file supplementary articles of incorporation for said corporation, to be known as Article VII, and to read as follows:

"In addition to the enterprise, business, pursuit and occupation in which this corporation proposes to engage set forth in the original Articles of Incorporation, this corporation proposes to engage and shall be authorized to engage in the business of buying and selling all kinds of dairy products and to act as agent for others in buying, selling, storing and otherwise handling and disposing of all kinds of dairy products and supplies for the manufacture of dairy products and to make such contracts and agreements in reference thereto as may be necessary to effectually carry out the purposes herein mentioned."

At the directors meeting the following officers were elected, George Williams, President, Jay Baker, Vice President; Tillamook County Bank, Treasurer, and Carl Haberlach, Sec. F. W. Christensen was engaged as inspector for the ensuing year.

Carl Haberlach was engaged as Secretary-Salesman at the same salary he was paid last year for the 18 factories in the association last season and at the same rate for Meda factory, he to pay his office rent and necessary clerical assistance.
