

DAIRY HERD INSPECTOR
FOR TILLAMOOK COUNTYBill Passed by the State Legislature—
Dairy Stock Must be Inspected
Every Year.

We give below Senate bill No. 106, introduced by Senator T. B. Handley, with amendments by Representative F. A. Rowe in the house. This is a bill that the dairymen of Tillamook County wanted, and its object is to weed out all diseased animals from the dairy herds, especially those suffering with tuberculosis, and to insure wholesome milk being taken to the cheese factories. The new law will also help to enhance the value of Tillamook cheese, for when it becomes generally known that the cheese is made from milk from healthy cattle inspected every year by a veterinarian with the local inspector employed by the Tillamook County Creamery Association to look after the making and grading of the cheese, the cheese from this county will have a great advantage over the cheese manufactured elsewhere. We understand that the person who is appointed herd inspector will be clothed with power to inspect barns and dairy farms to see that they are kept clean and sanitary. He will act as a deputy under the state veterinary surgeon.

It will be noticed that law does not compel a person to have his dairy herd inspected, but this can be covered by each of the dairy associations passing a resolution that no milk will be received at the factory from cows that have not been tested and given a bill of good health.

Another way to make dairy herd inspection compulsory, the herd inspector will be clothed with power by the State Veterinary, that it would make it almost compulsory for every dairyman in Tillamook County to have their cows inspected at least once a year.

Below we give the bill with the amendments inserted:

A bill for an Act the eradication and suppression of bovine tuberculosis, contagious, infectious and communicable diseases in the dairy herds of Tillamook County, Oregon, and creating the office of Tillamook County Dairy Herd Inspector, providing for his appointment and prescribing his duties and fixing his compensation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. There is hereby created for and in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, the office of Tillamook County Dairy Herd Inspector. Said inspector shall be appointed within sixty days from the taking effect of this act, by the County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon, with the approval of the State Veterinary of Oregon, and he shall hold office during the pleasure of said county court, and may be removed for cause at any time by said county court, in which case said county court shall immediately appoint another qualified person to his office.

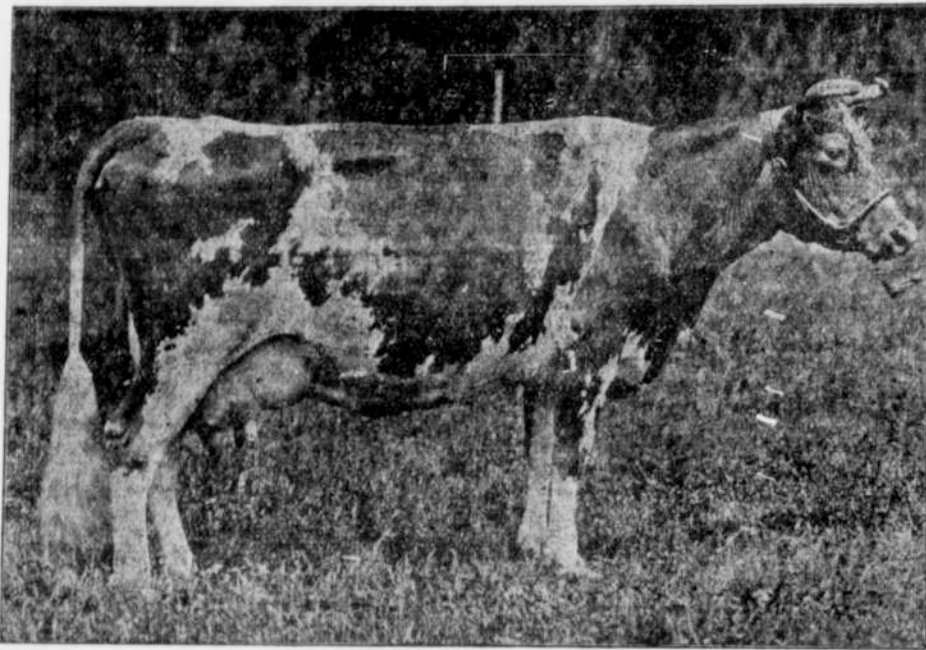
Section 2. Said Tillamook County Dairy Herd Inspector shall receive a salary to be fixed by the county court of Tillamook County, but not to exceed Ten Dollars per day for the time actually employed in performing his duties hereunder, to be paid from the general fund of said county in the manner that other county officers of said county are now paid, and he shall be a competent and qualified graduate in good standing, of a recognized veterinary college having a course of not less than three years, embracing terms of not less than six months a year, and he shall devote such time as may be necessary in the performance of the duties of his office, and shall reside during his term, in said Tillamook County, Oregon, and he shall receive no other compensation whatever for his said services, but his salary herein provided for shall cover all his traveling and other expenses. The county court may with the approval of the State Veterinary appoint such assistants to said inspector as may be necessary to complete the inspection as in this act provided for; such assistants to receive such compensation as may be fixed by the court, but not to exceed the rate allowable to said inspector.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of said inspector to inspect the dairy herds of Tillamook County, Oregon, in such manner as approved by the State Livestock Sanitary Board as to most effectually eradicate, infectious, contagious and communicable diseases of dairy animals from said county, and he shall have the full power and the duties of a deputy State Veterinarian within said Tillamook County Oregon. He shall collect a fee of fifteen cents per head for each and every cow inspected by him, and shall receipt therefor to the owner of said herd, and shall keep an accurate account thereof, and on or before the tenth day of each month turn the money so collected into the county treasurer of Tillamook County Oregon, for the use and benefit of the general fund of said county, and he shall, within ten days after the inspection of any herd, deliver a certificate of health to the owner covering such animals as did not show a suspicion or positive reaction to the tuberculin test or present clinical evidence of tuberculosis. Such certificate shall give the description of the animal certified and shall cover such particulars as age, sex, breed, temperature records, results of test or other information that the State Live Stock Sanitary Board shall demand. The said Tillamook County Dairy Herd Inspector shall at all times work under the direction of the State Livestock Sanitary Board and shall be governed by its rules and the provisions of Chapter XIV, Laws of 1911, creating the said board. He shall within Tillamook County, possess the full power of the above act creating the said board, and the rules and regulations of said board, given to a deputy State veterinarian, but shall not be entitled to claim reimbursement from the state for any services rendered or expense incurred, and his appointment shall at any time be revocable by the board.

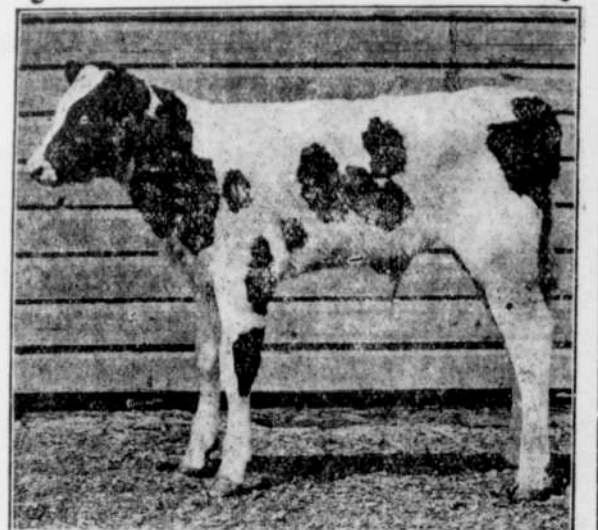

He shall make a monthly report of all such work done in said county and State, setting forth in a concise manner a detailed account of his actions as Dairy Herd Inspector of Tillamook County, Oregon.

One copy of said report to be filed with the State Veterinarian, and one copy to be filed with the county court and one copy to be retained and kept by said inspector. Said reports to be so made and filed on or before the tenth day of each month next succeeding that during which inspection was made.

Such inspection of the dairy herds of Tillamook County shall commence on or after August 1, 1917, and be completed within one year from said date, and a like inspection shall be made by said inspector annually thereafter, so that each cow, heifer and bull over one year old in said county shall be inspected at least once in each twelve months period.

Said inspector shall have the right and authority to enter the premises where the animal subject to inspection hereunder may be, and make such use of said premises as may be necessary to make the inspection herein provided for, and it shall be the duty of the person in charge of any such animal so being inspected to render said inspector or his assistants, such assistance as may be required in carrying out said work.

Section 4. Said Tillamook County Dairy Herd Inspector shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, give a bond to Tillamook County, Oregon, in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as hereinbefore provided.

Section 5. Nothing in this Act shall be construed as required or compelling any owner or owners of any cow or cows in said Tillamook County, Oregon, to have the same inspected by said inspector, unless said inspection is required by the existing laws of the State of Oregon.

Rose Plasker of the eighth grade had an essay on George Washington as follows:

George Washington was born in Westmoreland County, Va., February 22, 1732, and was the son of a good father and mother. One day his father gave him a hatchet as a present, and the first thing he did was to go out into the orchard and try it. He cut down one of his father's best cherry trees. When asked who did the mischief, the boy at once confessed that he had done it. His father and mother were very much pleased because he did not tell a lie.

In his early life he was a surveyor, and at nineteen was appointed mayor by Governor Dinwiddie. He helped England in her conquest against France. As he became older he became the guiding spirit of the Revolutionary War. Finally Congress appointed him commander-in-chief of the American army. He was a brave and prudent leader, and after many hardships won the war. Then the people elected him the savior of his country, President of the United States. He served two terms amidst the most trying times for the young commonwealth; declined a third term, afterwards retired to his beautiful home at Mt. Vernon.

On returning to private life, Washington was hailed by all the people with the proudest title a patriotic man may enjoy, the Father of his country.

When Washington died, December 14, 1799, the entire nation was bowed with grief at the death of him, who had been first in war, first in peace, and first in the heart of his countrymen.

OREGON STATE BOARD OF HORTICULTURE.

Notice of Repeal of Quarantine No. 2.

Whereas, on the 13th day of July, 1915, the President of the State Board of Horticulture did promulgate a notice of Quarantine No. 2, approved by the Governor of the State of Oregon, prohibiting the transportation of potatoes from the County of Tillamook, in the State of Oregon, into or through any part of the State of Oregon outside the said County of Tillamook, and whereas it appears to the President of the State Board of Horticulture that said quarantine is no longer necessary, now, therefore, I, Chas. A. Park, President of the State Board of Horticulture, do hereby give notice that the Quarantine No. 2, prohibiting the shipment of potatoes from Tillamook County as aforesaid, is no longer in force.
