William Tohl vs. H. F. Effenberger, Mary Effenberger, Anna Kline and Herman Tohl is a suit filed in the circuit court asking the court to construe and interpret the provisions of the will of the late Henry Tohl, and that it be decreed that the heirs take as beneficiaries by equal shares of all the property of the estate, except the amounts specially bequeathed to certain individuals; that all of the heirs of the deceased be decreed to be beneficiaries and entitled to take equal shares, and that H. F. Effenberger be decreed to have no right, title or interest in or to the property.

The Coast Power Co. has bought out George Chappe's stock and taken over the light plant at Rockaway. The company will extend their lines to that place and will furnish lights to Garibaldi, Barview and Rockaway. On Wednesday County Judge Hare and County Surveyor Shreve and J. C. Edwards and representatives of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co., went over the route north of this city for the purpose of arranging for the electric company taking one side of the road for their polls and the telephone company the other side of the road.

The Public Service Commission has rendered a decision in the case of the Tillamook County Mutual Telephone Co., which filed a complaint against the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co., alleging that the latter company was insufficient and inadequate, and its practice unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory in that it refused to permit an interchange of traffic. In a lengthy decision the Commissions allows the Mutual Company to make connection, on condition that it is charged above the regular rate and the Mutual Company is to install and maintain the necessary plant and equipment at the office of the Pacific Company so as to make possible the interchange of long distance traffic between the two companies.

A full house witnessed the performance of the "Convict's Daughter" by the Dramatic Club on Saturday night, and a more enjoyable evening could not be asked for. The many different characters were handled in a manner that is worthy of considerable praise. Mrs. Flo McKinley as France Lee, the Convict's Daughter, was a decided success, and her many friends may feel justly proud of the very able performance she gave of a difficult part. TILLAMOOK GOOD ROAD BOOSTERS GET BUSY

A Big Gathering at the Court House Monday Evening.

On Monday evening there was a large gathering of business men and others at the Court House, called by the Tillamook Commercial Club, for the purpose of discussing road matters and the bills recently passed by the State Legislature. A large delegation was down from Nehalem and a number of farmers were also present.

Fred C. Baker, president of the Commercial Club, called the meeting to order, and the two first speakers were Senator T. B. Handley and Representative Frank A. Rowe, who dwelt on the features of the road bills passed by the state legislature, especially the bill which provides for a \$6,000,000 bond issue which is to be submitted to a vote of the people. The different features of this bill was discussed, particularly that relating to Tillamook County, for the bill calls for a hard surfaced road from the Clatsop County line to Garibaldi, by way of Wheeler, and for 20 miles of hard surfaced road, or more south of Tillamook City. Every phase of the question was argued pro and con by those who favored bonding and those who were opposed. F. R. Beals paid Senator Handley and Representative Rowe compliments for their labors while at Salem. He was a strong advocate of bonding the county. The Nehalem delegation appeared to be opposed to bonding the county unless they obtained a promise that certain roads in that vicinity were hard surfaced.

After nearly three hours discussion, the chairman suggested that there be a committee appointed to plan out some system to look after the county's interest, so as to be prepared whenever state or Federal aid was available. A motion to that effect was made and carried. The chairman stated that he would not appoint the committee until the next day, and on Tuesday he appointed, Frank A. Rowe, H. Effenberger, Fred Zaddach, Fred R. Beals, Charles Kunze, H. T. Botts, Herman Farmer, Will Christensen and L. M. Kraner.

MRS. IRA PETTIT GUILTY.

Former Tillamook Woman Gets ten Years for Killing Husband.

Roseburg, Or., Feb. 17.—Mrs. Irma Pettit, who a few months ago shot and killed her husband, R. E. Pettit, on the streets of Mont Clements, Mich., was recently convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced to a term of ten years in the House of Correction at Detroit. Mrs. Pettit pleaded insanity.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Pettit formerly lived in Portland. Mr. Pettit was a one time connected with the Multnomah Hotel grill. They were also connected with hotels at Tillamook and Grants Pass. Mrs. Pettit's mother is said to reside near Portland.

At the time of the murder Mrs. Pettit said she killed her husband because he was attentive to other women.
