Oregonian Deals With the State Bond Bill.

The Oregonian, in answer to a correspondent, gives some useful information in regard to the State bond bill, and we hope the people of Tillamook will read it carefully, for it will prevent people from forming wrong ideas. It says: If one will read the law closely, as published in full in the Sunday Oregonian, and examine the map that accompanied it, he will learn that the \$6,000,000, to be provided by a prospective issuance of state bonds, is to be devoted almost wholly to hard surfacing roads on which the grading, draining and other work preliminary to paving has been or will be undertaken by the counties. Specific exceptions are made in behalf of two or three counties, which, in attempting to build trunk highways, have already exceeded the limit of their bonded indebtedness.

It is not impossible to strike a fairly accurate general average of the cost of paving roads already prepared for hard surface. Width of pavement would, of course, enter into the calculation, but it is estimated that if the type adopted largely in California, and there found satisfactorily, be accepted, the \$6,000,000 will pave about 600 miles of road. This type is a nine or ten-foot pavement, with crushed rock raised to the level of each side for shoulders.

The post roads and forest roads are not to be paved in general. Their construction from the beginning when necessary, is contemplated. These roads are to be paid for out of moneys provided in another bill and out of Government allotments under the Shakerlaw. In the next five years the Government will spend in co-operation with Oregon \$1,800,000 for post roads and \$638,970 for forest roads. The state will spend an equal amount in addition to the proposed \$6,000,000.

The total available therefore, for state paved roads and co-operative post roads and forest roads in the next five years, if the bond issue be approved, will be \$9,738,970.

The money heretofore mentioned as required to meet Government allotments is to be provided for by a state bond issue, not involved with the \$6,000,000 proposal and not referred to the people. But interest and principal of the two bond issues, it is demonstrated by accurate computations, can be paid off and maintenance assured by applying automobile licenses and the existing quarter mill highway levy to those purposes. In other words no increase in taxation is proposed.

The State Highway Commission, in the bonding bill, is given certain discretionary powers. It need not construct the highways in the order named in the bill; it may change routes in local particulars, but must follow the general designation. It is permitted, however to co-operate with the Government in construction of post or forest roads not named in the bill. That not all prospective state income for road purposes is taken is apparent. The amortization and maintenance are assured on the basis of the present tax valuation and the present number of automobiles. If either or both increase, and no one doubts that they will, there will be more money for roads. Curry and Lincoln Counties, therefore, have expectation of getting state and government aid for roads, provided they can convince the Federal authorities and the State Highway Commission that such roads should be built.

The highways were designated clearly with the idea of providing an adequate system of trunk lines touching as many important places as possible. Of course, it would have been politically inexpedient to designate a spider web system of roads confined solely to the lower Willamette valley, for example. Moreover, it would have been unfair. It is not a sound argument against the bill that the people are invited to vote for it because it makes a just designation of routes. If it were, the state would be deadlocked on the road problem. An unfair allotment of funds or an unfair designation of roads would naturally be called "hogging". If a fair allotment and designation are to be condemned as "smarting," there is nothing to be done. We shall stay stuck in the mud.

In answer to the correspondent's hypothetical question as to what roads will be constructed if the money available is not sufficient to build all the roads designated, The Oregonian can only say that it believes the people are willing to trust the Governor to select a Highway Commission that will deal justly with all interests.

AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

By R. C. Jones, County Agriculturalist.

The Silo Excursion a Big Success.

In spite of the bad, snowy weather prevailing last week, the three silo excursions held throughout the county were a decided success. One thing was gained by the inclement weather and that was a crowd that was intensely interested or they would not have braved the storm.

Monday, in the Nestucca Valley about twenty turned out at the Beals' ranch at Pacific City, and saw some very good grass and clover silage. Mr. Beals has two silos on this ranch and states that he would not think of dairying without them. They are at present feeding 98 head of cows and young stock. In the afternoon the trip was made to Herman Farmer's and R. O. Richard's near Beaver. These men have both used corn and artichokes for silage, as well as native grass, and speak very highly of the silo.

The trip to Nehalem on Tuesday was made in one of the worst snow storms of the season. The Ford broke through the snow in about eight inches of snow. Only about eight men took in this trip, but they were all very interested and expect to build silos in the near future.

Prospects at 10 a.m. on Wednesday morning, when the Tillamook excursion was supposed to start, looked very bad for a crowd, but by 10:30 three Fords had assembled, loaded to the guards. Before we left Mr. Erickson's, the first silo visited, we had about thirty present, and the crowd kept increasing until the end of the trip, when we had about sixty along. All the different types of silos in this district were visited and questions were freely asked of the men using them. The materials used in the silo by these men are grass, corn, artichokes, oats, clover and weeds, and all say they would not sell their silos for any price if they could not replace them.

The ladies of the Fairview Grange were asked to prepare a 25 cent lunch for us, but instead, got us up a big dinner for the same price. I understand the proceeds are to be used to better equip the grange kitchen. After the dinner a general discussion followed on silos, silage and silage machinery.

The last silo visited was that belonging to C. W. Tilden, a cement plastered silo in the center of his round barn. This round barn appealed to many of the farmers as a very practical layout.

After the silo trip was finished, Mr. Kunze invited the crowd to visit his farm and see his sleeping shed built for his cattle to stay in during the winter months. About 25 farmers accepted the invitation. This shed, well bedded, gives the cows perfect freedom and saves all the manure in perfect condition. He is very well pleased with results.

Several farmers expressed their appreciation of the trip by saying that they considered the day one of the best spent ones they had put in this winter. More real knowledge was gained of the silo than could be obtained in any other way.

To any contemplating building a silo I shall be glad to render any aid possible if they will let me know.

Poisoning Moles Not Practical.

A few weeks ago instructions for poisoning moles with poisoned beef steak were sent out to the papers by mistake. This formula has been used, experimentally, but the results were not good enough to warrant its general use. Trapping is the best method to use in controlling this pest.

Gopher Poisoning O. K.

The formula published for poisoning the pocket gopher works alright, as this animal takes the poison readily. For fear some did not get it I will repeat it here:

Use parsnips, carrots or sweet potatoes for bait and cut up into about 1/2 inch cubes. From a small pepper box slowly sift 1/2 ounce powdered strychnine (alkaloid) and 1-10 of this amount of saccharine (ground together in a mortar or cup) over about four quarts of the freshly cut baits, stirring to distribute the poison evenly.

These then should be placed in the runways, which can best be done by the use of a pointed stick, probing around a mound until it breaks through into the runway and dropping the bait into the hole.

The pocket gopher is very active in the early spring months and takes the poison readily, so now is the time to get after him.

The Digger Squirrel or Gray Digger

Can be easily poisoned with poisoned barley meal in the following manner.

The strychnine and saccharine as used for the gopher baits should be stirred into a half teacup full of laundry starch. This should be then poured over about four quarts of barley and stirred thoroughly so that each grain receives a coating. A teaspoonful of the treated bait scattered about the mouth of the burrough or under the logs or stumps where they live will be readily taken. They are most easily poisoned in the spring when they first come out of their winter quarters.

Last Saturday a number of Guernsey enthusiasts met at Rollie Watson's office and organized the Tillamook Guernsey Club. Mr. Joseph Durrer was elected president and Homer Mason Sec.-Treas. James Williams, John Naegeli and W. L. Hudson were elected as board of directors.

The meeting was adjourned until Saturday, March 10, at 1:30 p.m., when a constitution will be adopted and a permanent organization formed. Every one who favors the Guernsey cow and would like to see the breed developed in this county are invited to be present. The charter member list is still open.
