At a meeting of the directors of the Tillamook County Mutual Telephone Co., on Saturday, it was decided to make connections with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. The Mutual is to pay 10c differential, and the connections to be made by the 15th.

The Long Prairie Water Company held its annual meeting last Saturday and elected officers and transacted other business matters of importance. The following officers were elected, Pres., Peter Suter; Clarence Tilden and Henry Landolt, Directors; I. J. Earl, Clerk; W. J. Riechers, tres.

Mrs. Dora B. Schilke, of La-Grande, Worthy Grand Matron of Oregon, came in on Monday and was met at the depot by a delegation from the Eastern Star lodge. That evening she gave a talk in the lodge room which was followed with a banquet. The Worthy Grand Matron visited the Bay City Lodge on Tuesday.

Jay Baker, of Beaver, Martin Jenck, of Cloverdale, Jim Williams, Geo. Williams and Wm. Maxwell, of Tillamook, and W. H. Christensen, of Oretown, members of the Board of Directors of Tillamook County Creamery Association, met here on Monday and transacted business coming before them. Cheese has advanced to 23 cents and 24 cents per pound, Portland. The indications are that Cheese will average close to 19 and 20 cents for the year 1917. The dairymen's prospects are very bright.

The monthly meeting of the Association of Charities was held on Tuesday evening, with the President, Rev. J. E. Youel, in the chair. Several matters pertaining to charity work was taken up and disposed of. It was stated that some unknown person had contributed \$200.00 to the Association, and others were willing to contribute. After the business was disposed of the matter of Belgian relief was brought up by Prof. Kirk, and it was suggested that those who wanted to donate towards the fund should do so through the finance committee, which is composed of J. C. Edwards, Mrs. F. R. Beals and Mrs. M. W. Harrison.

At the meeting of the city council on Monday, it was decided to call a special election on Tuesday, March 22, as to whether pool and reading rooms are to be allowed to remain open on Sundays. Upon its own initiative the city decided to submit the question as to whether card rooms could remain open on Sundays. In the matter of the dangerous condition of the ceiling of the auditorium of the city hall, City Attorney Botts was instructed to send a night letter to Architect Burgraaf and have him fix it at once. The city council recommended that a fire escape be built at the High School building, and took up some matters of street improvement.

Ruth Tohl vs. Julius Tohl is a divorce case filed in the circuit court. These parties were married in Tillamook County on November 14th, 1914, and no children were born to the union. The complaint alleges cruel and inhuman treatment as the grounds upon which she seeks the dissolution of the marriage contract. She charges the defendant with refusing to provide proper support and compelled plaintiff to make her own expenses, buy her clothes, etc. He continuously found fault and scolded and nagged, and at one time, while they were residing on the homestead, defendant, without cause or excuse, seized plaintiff while she was lying on her bed and dragged her around the house by her feet, and slapped and beat her with such force as to draw blood. Defendant also accused her of being untrue to him and living with another man, all of which was absolutely untrue.

Considerable discussion took place in Tillamook when it became known that Senator Lane was one of the senators who resorted to filibustering and would not support President Wilson when a national crisis confronted the country. As a result of his action, a movement is on foot to demand his resignation. It seems that the recall provisions of the Oregon constitution does not include U. S. Senators and representatives, but if the law had done so recall petitions would have been immediately circulated. Following is the wording of the petitions sent to a number of newspapers: Harry Lane, Senator for Oregon.

Sir:—We, the undersigned, voters of the State of Oregon, view with shame and humiliation your failure to uphold the honor of the United States at the most critical moment of the entire history of our international relations.

No words can adequately describe our chargin that the State of Oregon should be so misrepresented and disgraced as it has been by your action. We indignantly protest against this action through the love we bear to our state and our country, which you have dishonored and belittled before the eyes of the world and we demand on account of this misrepresentation your resignation as senator from this state.
