In addition, each Assessor is specifically required, on completion of his assessment roll, to take an oath to the effect that he has dilligently and to the best of his ability assessed all taxable property in his county, subject to assessment by him, at the full cash value thereof. The members of the State Tax Commission are required to subscribe to a similar oath on the completion of the assessment roll prepared by them. (Sec. 3656, Lord's Oregon Laws, as amended by Laws of 1913, page 378.)
