MILK SUGAR FACTORY.

Articles Incorporating New Company Are Filed.

It will interest a good many of the dairymen to know that the milk sugar factory is to be operated again, a new company having been organized, which will have the name of the Pacific Milk Sugar Company, with a capital stock of \$15,000, and of that amount \$13,000 is paid up. The incorporators are Fletcher Linn, of Portland; M. W. Harrison, of Tillamook; and J. H. Featherston, of Spokane, Wash. The new company took over the factory near the Maple Leaf cheese factory, and the plant is being put in condition to commence operations which will be a few weeks.

Mr. Featherston informs us that he has received great encouragement since he arrived here last Thursday with Mrs. Featherston, and the indications are that a large number of dairymen will be willing to contract their whey, especially as the feeding qualities of the whey is reduced by the cheese factories separating the butter from the whey before it is turned into the whey tank. This does not reduce the value of the whey for milk sugar, but it makes it almost useless for feed for hogs. We hope the dairymen will furnish the new company with a large quantity of whey, and that it will prove a success, for it is a commendable enterprise.

The Spokesman Review had this to say of Mr. Featherston: "J. H. Featherston for several years part owner and manager of the Imperial Coffee and Tea company in Spokane, and wife left last night for Portland. He will engage in the manufacture of sugar of milk at Tillamook, Ore., about 50 miles south of Astoria. "There are 22 cheese factories in the that vicinity," said Mr. Featherston, "and the Tillamook cheese is setting the price on the coast." "The company will be the reorganization of a former company and I will be manager, associated with Fletcher Linn, of Portland and Mr. Harrison, president of the Tillamook County Bank.

"Sugar of milk is made of whey through evaporation and is sold largely as a baby food."

Mr. Featherston has been in Spokane for 10 years, having started as an assayer and chemist. He went into the tea and coffee business 16 years ago.

Do's Tillamook Need a Sunday Law?

If so, why? Every one can close his store or place of business on Sunday, if he wishes to. No one is compelled to work on Sunday. All are free to go to church or stay at home, to read their bibles or any other book or paper they desire. They can spend the whole day in devotional services if they wish.

On the other hand, those who are not religiously inclined have the same liberty to eat, drink, sing, play, work, take an auto ride, buy cigars, soft drinks and candy, and attend base ball games or theatres.

Who is asking for this Sunday law in Tillamook? What would it prohibit? Will it permit one to read his bible, pray, sing hymns, and go to church on Sunday? Oh, yes, you have full liberty to do all of that. You may even come from Portland or Cloverdale in your car, drop your offering from one cent to ten dollars in the contribution basket and it will be all right. "Brother, God bless you for your liberal offering." Even the ministers will offer a prayer for you for the offering you have so freely given.

But when church service is over, and you find the gasoline low in your car, or perchance you want to buy a cigar, candy, peanuts, or some lemonade to quench your thirst before starting home, you find to your surprise that no gasoline, fruit, candy, or tobacco can be bought in Tillamook on Sunday.

Should you persuade a man to sell you five gallons of gasoline so you could return home and milk your cows, some one is liable to be fined or sent to jail. For what? For buying or selling something outside of the church. You may order and pay for Sunday school supplies or pay the preacher on Sunday, and it is all right. The church can do business seven days of the week, but all others only six.

Is not this Sunday law ordinance calling for class or church favoritism? The church may do business seven days each week, while outside of it six days is the limit. Who wants this law? The church of course.

Rev. S. V. Leech, D. D. wrote in the Homiletic Review, "Give us good Sunday laws, well enforced by men in local authority, and our churches will be full of worshippers."
