Committed Suicide.

On Thursday morning of last week Wm. J. Berns found the body of John Kaiser in the north fork of the Nehalem river. About two months ago Kaiser leased the Aug. Ludke place on the Nehalem, having formerly lived with Joe Blattler at Long Prairie. Kaiser had evidently committed suicide, having taken two methods to insure success. When the body was found it was discovered that the throat had been cut, and in the cabin a razor was found with blood on it. The man had evidently intended to kill himself by cutting his throat and bleeding to death, but the small cut in the throat did not complete the job as rapidly as the man expected, so he went to the river and jumped in with the purpose of drowning himself. Coroner Henkle was notified and summoned a jury, which brought in a verdict that Kaiser had committed suicide.

Carl Haberlach's Trip to California

Carl Haberlach returned from California Monday. When asked regarding his trip he made the following statement:

"I left for California a week ago Saturday. By traveling by rail eight nights it gave me a whole week there, one day in San Diego, three in Los Angeles and two in San Francisco. The idea was to get the idea of the larger buyers as to their views in regard to what prices they would consider storing cheese should present conditions generally continue for another two months, or when we come to the flush of production. It would hardly be expected that present prices continue that long, nor would any one store cheese at present prices. Their ideas were generally that should present conditions prevail 18c. would be about the price which they would expect to store cheese at. The export price at present fixes our prices, as we can keep our market on a level permitting cheese to be exported. Of course in case this country entered the war, no one can tell the future of the market. Found some cheese in all three markets, but most buyers were low on stock. All that was held was in firm hands. Had we had the stocks on the market we could have received more money, but no buyer wants to load up with stock that may not arrive on the market for two weeks."

"Prices of all commodities seem to be high down there with the exception of rice and lemons. They have had some needed rains lately and this will help them out, but generally their spring is three or four weeks later than usual."

"In order to get an idea out side the cities, I took a couple of ninety mile drives east and south of Los Angeles. They have immense crops of oranges and lemons and otherwise their farming seems to speak of prosperity. The fine roads generally to be found in Southern California and their fine climate attract thousands of visitors annually, to which considerable of their prosperity is attributed. Most of their roads are constructed with a concrete base, covered with an asphalt wearing surface."

"Tillamook cheese is of course well regarded down there and is largely taking the place of Eastern cheese. We are going to have to pay more attention to our brands and we have several ideas we are now working on. It will be necessary to stamp the word "Tillamook" on every cheese and the cheese makers cannot be too careful in branding both boxes and cheese. We should also spend a little money in advertising, so the people generally will know what to ask for."

Teachers' Institute at Bay City.

The first local Teachers' Institute of the year met at Bay City in the high school building last Saturday in answer to a call issued by County Superintendent Lamb.

The meeting was well attended by teachers from various parts of the county.

In the afternoon the Women Teachers' Club and the School Masters Club each met in separate session. These two clubs are well attended, and both are doing good work. There is a most excellent field in which both clubs can do much for the schools of the county.

The Women's Club sprung a complete surprise on the School Masters Club, by inviting the school men with their wives and families to join them in an excursion sometime in the near future. It is needless to say the men lost no time in unanimously accepting the invitation.

In the afternoon the teachers met in joint session and for a time discussed questions of interest to all. Mr. Kirk, Supt. of the Tillamook City schools, interested the teachers very much in a talk on "The Community a Complex Machine." Mrs. Terry's talk on club work was instructive. Mrs. Wiley read a very interesting paper on literature for children. Mr. Brimhall, of Garibaldi schools gave some very practical suggestions. Several teachers were to have been on the program, but time was too limited to hear all.

The host of the day, Prof. Wyman of the Bay City schools, made the teachers feel that they were welcome to his schools.

We all feel very grateful to the Bay City teachers, especially to Prof. Wyman who on behalf of the School Masters Club, and Miss Nagle who on behalf of the Women's Club, co-operated in making the Institution a success.

A delicious lunch was served the teachers at the Bay View Hotel.

The next institute will be held in Tillamook City, Saturday, March 31, at which time Assistant Supt. Frank K. Wells will be present and aid in the work.
