Teachers Meet at Tillamook.
 Last week Frank Wells, assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in company with County Superintendent G. B. Lamb, visited all the standard High Schools of this county. The schools were found to be in very satisfactory condition.
 The High School at Beaver, never before inspected by the state office, was found to be in good condition and doing three years of high school work. Next year the fourth year will be taken up. This school is found to have now nearly all the required equipment. Soon as the remainder is purchased a certificate of standardization will be issued to it. The Beaver school is well situated and on doubt will be well patronized.
 A very profitable local institute was held in the high school auditorium in Tillamook last Saturday. This meeting was well attended, there being fifty-six teachers present from various parts of the county.
 Mr. Wells, from the State Superintendent's office, delivered two very practical talks on common problems of the school.
 Sup. W. R. Kirk's talk on reading was helpful to the teachers.
 Mrs. Ford's talk on industrial club work showed the possibilities of such work in the rural schools. Some of the teachers and scholars fail to grasp the possibilities of industrial club work.

MOVEMENT TO START SHIP-BUILDING IN TILLAMOOK.

Business Men Pledge Financial Aid to the Amount of \$10,000.00.
 A hurried meeting was called on Thursday evening of business men at the Commercial Club rooms for the purpose of discussing a proposition to lend financial assistance to the firm of Feeny & Bremer Co., which had been figuring upon starting a shipbuilding plant in Tillamook for several months. The government had advertised for bids for a large number of submarine chasers, and Mr. Feeny went to Portland to see whether he could get in on the bids, and meeting Thad Robison and F. R. Beals there, they took the matter up and gave it their endorsement. The meeting Thursday was to ascertain whether the business men would give their financial assistance to the enterprise. Quite a number of business men attended and the meeting was adjourned to the council chamber. It was imperative that quick action be taken as the bids were to be in the next day. Although no vote was taken on the matter it was informally agreed to give financial assistance and \$5000.00 was pledged that evening. Next day this was increased to \$8,250.00, and as \$10,000.00 is required, it will be no trouble to raise that amount.
 Mr. Feeny returned on Sunday and he informed us that he put in a bid to build nine submarine chasers, which would amount to over \$300,000 and he thinks he stands a good chance of obtaining the contract. The bids were opened in Seattle early on Saturday morning and his bid was in a good position, with a good large surity bond at the back of it. The bids were wired to Washington and it is expected the contracts will be awarded in the next few days.

 Mark Woodruff, publicity director for the Portland Chamber of Commerce, was struck with the aid and support given to the new shipbuilding industry at Grays Harbor, which he visited Wednesday.
 "The Peterson Company was financed by the business men of that district," he said, "to the extent of \$11,000. Merchants and business men gave their notes to that amount and this money was used as collateral by the company in executing their contracts for ships.
 "As a result, the company, which started without money but had a man at its head who knew all about shipbuilding, has been able to launch four boats, has three more on the ways and contracts are in hand for an additional five. The original capital of \$11,000 has been repaid."

Harry Sappington Drowns.
 Bandon, Or., April 1.—Harry Sappington, 24 years old, was drowned in the Coquille river near Parkersburg today and parties are dragging the river for the body.
