**Sues County for Damages.**  
 Nell Rasmussen vs Tillamook County is a suit filed in the Circuit Court to recover \$2,400.00 damages. It is alleged in the complaint that the plaintiff is living at the Fred Burton residence, defendants while supervising, controlling and directing county work, carelessly and negligently piled and dumped in an irregular manner a large number of road plank along and upon the road in front of the Burton residence, which completely shut off travel, except by going over the plank, and that on the 3rd of October 1916, while plaintiff was walking over the plank, one of the plank tipped and threw plaintiff causing her to be bruised and severely injured, for this she claims \$2,000.00 damages and \$400.00 to pay for medical attendance, nurse, medicine and hospital bills.

**"Men and Yet More Men."**  
 We do not want to come to the "white feather" days of England, when young women went about the streets pinning that badge of cowardice on men's lapels. Women have shown that they feel something of this spirit or reproach toward the stronger sex already, in their many preparedness enterprises. They have done well; they have been modest about it, and they are needed. But our first need is men.  
 Captain Bispham, representing the commandant of the navy yard at the mayor's defense meeting, had good reasons for saying:  
 Our great need is men, men and yet more men. We cannot organize out of thin air, and the time the men are needed is now.
