State Industrial Accident Commission vs. Barney A. Knoblock is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$28.29 due the commission. Defendant operated a saw mill and failed to pay the insurance for the men employed.

State Industrial Accident Commission vs. Charles W. Gilmore is a suit filed in the circuit court, the defendant having failed to pay industrial insurance for men while operating a sawmill. The claim sued for amounts to \$32.79.

Sandborn-Cutting Co. vs. J. W. Butler and C. F. Stone doing business under the firm name of the Bay City Storage and Fisheries Co., is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$695.59 for merchandise furnished the defendants.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces that a postoffice clerk examination will be held at Tillamook, Oregon, on May 12, 1917, to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of clerk at the Tillamook postoffice. Both men and women will be admitted. Age limits are 18 to 45 years. Application blank and information may be obtained from the local secretary, Board of Civil Service examiners, at the Tillamook postoffice, or the Secretary, 11th Civil Service District, 303 Post Office Building, Seattle, Wash.

Tillamook County Bank and Wesley G. Day vs. E. D. Severance, Flora F. Severance, Walter M. Severance and Baker Loan and Trust Co. is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover several sums of money. The complaint alleges that in May, 1914, at the special instance and request of E. D. Severance and his father the plaintiff bany loaned and advanced to them the sum of \$15,414.00, executing promissory notes for same. The plaintiffs now ask judgment against the defendant for \$7,704.00, \$896.00, \$300.00, \$427.93 and \$61.20 with attorneys fees, and that certain property be sold to pay off the indebtedness.

The case of Ed Hummel, who was tried last week for using treasonable language, was taken under advisement by Justice of the Peace Stanley. District Attorney Goynes put up a strong case against the accused with an array of witnesses who all testified that Hummel had said that he would fight for Germany in the event of the United States going to war with that country. Hummel testified himself, and his own evidence helped to convict him. One thing was noticeable, however, that he was incoherent at times, and it is a question whether the man's mind is not a little unbalanced when it comes to talking about

the war. District Attorney Goynes had the evidence in the case sent to the federal authorities, and Hummel is held in the county jail until some action is taken.

W. G. Shellenbarger, deputy grand master of the Grand Masonic Lodge of Oregon, will be in Tillamook County Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. On Thursday evening he will visit Cloverdale lodge, on Friday evening he will be with Tillamook lodge and Saturday evening will be spent with Bay City lodge. Members and officers of Tillamook lodge are making special preparations to receive Mr. Shellenbarger. Work will be given in the third degree. A special invitation is extended to all members of the lodge and to visiting brethren to attend the meeting on Friday evening.

On last Friday night 12 new members were added to the order and on the Friday night preceding there were 4 members accepted.
