Mt. Hebo District to be Reforested.

Eugene, April 21.—The forest service will replant 420 acres of burned area in the Mount Hebo district in Tillamook county in the Siuslaw national forest this year, according to Hugh B. Rankin, supervisor of the forest, with headquarters in Eugene. The first shipment of the small

Douglas fir trees which will be planted left the government nursery at Wind River, Wash., a week ago, and is expected to have reached the scene of planting by this time. A crew of about 35 men will be employed at the work, and it is estimated that it will take them six weeks to plant the 285,000 trees in this assortment, if the weather is favorable.

The Mt. Hebo district has been the scene of replanting for a number of years.
