**Editorial Snap Shots.**

We believe it "I don't know anything that I can do that will increase the value of my farm more than a hard surfaced highway through the county," said a dairyman the other day.

The Clatsop County Court is onto its job. It knows that the Neah-Kah-Nie Mountain route will not only be a great boosting, scenic road for Tillamook county, but Clatsop county sees that it will help boost that county as well.

Are you going to vote for or against Tillamook County obtaining about 60 miles of hard surfaced road to be paid for by the state bonds and auto licenses, the county simply to prepare the road bed, which will amount to little in comparison to what the hard surfacing will cost.

Our Democratic friend, Bro. Trombley, was a great booster for Harry Lane for U. S. Senator, the man who would not support the president in a national crisis, and we suppose at the next state election will be boosting for West to jump into Lane's shoes. But Oregon has had enough of Chamberlain-Lane-West combination.

We are told that the farmers are opposed to bonding the state for hard surfaced roads, which will benefit them more than any other class. If we may be permitted to make a remark, a large number of farmers are falling all over themselves to obtain farm loans from money raised by bonds. And when one looks over county records he finds in this county that many farmers have mortgages, which is the same as a bond, on their dairy farms.

For the information of our citizens the millage tax will be about \$5,000 a year for Tillamook County and the automobile license will pay for the \$6,000,000 bond issue, which gives Tillamook County between 50 and 60 miles of hardsurfaced pavement. Whether the state bond measure carries or not, the county will have to pay the \$5,000, which goes into the state highway fund, and if this county is not in a position to prepare the road bed, the money will be used in other counties.

The cement trust of Portland pleaded guilty in the Federal Court and paid a fine of \$10,000 for alleged combination to apportion territory and control prices. We don't see why these rascals should not be given a jail sentence. A person sells a bottle of beer or a bottle of whisky and gets a fine and jail sentence but the Portland cement trust gets off with a fine, four of the companies paying a fine of \$2,500 each. There is no doubt but what they had a good laugh when they found they were not sent to jail.

When the Nehalem Times, the Headlight and certain Tillamook wire pullers get through locating the Wheeler-Nehalem road and bridge, the Wheeler Reporter may have a word to say on the subject.—Wheeler Reporter.

Why jump onto the Headlight when there are so many prominent citizens in the Nehalem Valley who are opposed to a bridge being built from Dean's Point to Wheeler? Well, the snap shot man has seen a good many newspapers started to boost real estate, and as the Reporter is in that class, what it has to say will have little or no weight with the people of the county.

Some amazing remarks are made by those who oppose the \$6,000,000 state bond measure. Mr. Spence, Master of the State Grange, makes the glaring assertion that the hard surface policy cost Multnomah County \$2,000,000 in royalties. That county expended \$1,250,000 on hard surfaced roads. The Master of the State Grange is certainly making himself look foolish. Here is another absurd assertion: Some of those who are opposing the measure say it will cost \$10,000 a mile to prepare the road bed. State Engineer Nunn went over some of the roads in Yamhill county last week and stated that it would cost less than \$150.00 per mile to make ready certain stretches of roads in that county for the hard surfacing. It seems to us that there are a number of agitators

who have started a campaign of lies and false insinuations to defeat the state bond measure, and we hope the people will resent that kind of thing in June. We believe they will.

District Attorney E. B. Tongue, of Washington County, made a novel suggestion to the County Court of that county, which he related at a good roads meeting last week. This is what he said:

"It was the muddy roads with which the county had struggled for years. The bonds promise relief and for one he was willing to take a chance. As to placing a mortgage on the state, he said that every farmer mortgaged his farm if he found it advantageous and most city enterprises were built in the same way. He owned a farm of 200 acres and had been trying to make a trip to it for several weeks, but automobiles could not get through the mud. He had made a proposition to the county court that he would assess himself \$10 an acre if the county court would build a hard surface road to the place, and he would place a mortgage on the place to get the money. The road would be a great benefit to him individually to justify doing this and the same would be true with the state as a whole."

**GERMANS ROUSE IRE.**

**Teutons in America Scorned By Kaiser Before War.**

Washington, April 30.—Count von Bernstorff, ex-German Ambassador to the United States, before the war spoke disparagingly of German citizens in this country, saying they had run away from the fatherland to avoid military service and were "outlaws", according to a statement made public today by Senator Phelan, of California, in connection with comment on the passage of the war Army bill.

The remarks attributed to Von Bernstorff, Senator Phelan explained, were made during an interview which he had with the Ambassador in Munich in 1913 in an effort to get Germany to participate in the Panama-Pacific Exposition. Mr. Phelan urged a German exhibit on the ground that Germans in the United States would be proud of it.

"He immediately resented that," said Senator Phelan in his statement, "Much to my surprise he substantially said, 'do not talk about those people. We do not care what they think or want. They have deserted the fatherland. They have run away to avoid military duty. They have been false to the old traditions. They are outlaws,' and that was the sentiment of official Germany then, as I believe it is today. They regard those good people, who are expected to render service to the autocracy now, as outlaws, as men who have fled from their duty."

"I think our German-American citizens should know and understand that that is the Prussian estimate of them, and they would be confirmed in what I believe to be their sincere conviction that their duty lies with America in this struggle."

**4 "Cement Trust" Penalties \$10,000.**

Officers of four cement companies that had been included in a Federal indictment against members of the so-called "cement-trust" charging an illegal combination to apportion territory and control prices, in behalf of their companies entered pleas of guilty before Federal Judge Wolverton on Monday.

Charles L. Reames, United States Attorney, had first made the statement in court that it would be satisfactory to the Government to have one defendant from each of the four companies enter a plea of guilty for the corporation and dismiss the indictment as against the other defendants from these companies.

Judge Wolverton, upon recommendation of United States Attorney Reames, fined each of the four defendants \$2500, a total of \$10,000, which was paid by certified checks.

The four who entered pleas of guilty on behalf of their companies and were fined were W. H. George, secretary of the Cowell Portland Cement Company; F. G. Drum, president of the Pacific Portland Cement Company; William G. Henshaw, president of the Riverside Portland Cement Company, and George T. Cameron, president of the Santa Cruz Portland Cement Company, all California corporations.

Before pronouncing sentence, the court asked the United States Attorney if whatever combination there may have been in restraint of trade had been dissolved. Mr. Reames replied that it had been.

**"BUY A HOME-FIRST" CAMPAIGN.**  
**Movement Should be Started in Tillamook for "Owning Your Own Home."**

The "Buy a Home-First" Committee, of Portland, sends out the following circular letter which should interest the people of this city. It is as follows:

The "Buy a Home-First" movement was started by the Executive Committee of the National Association of Real Estate Boards at a meeting held in Savannah recently. The Association had for some time been investigating a falling off in home buying and building and finally decided that this was largely due to the fact that the men are buying autos, diamonds and fine clothes—first and homes last.

Not only had the building of homes ceased, but the purchases of materials entering into the construction and equipment of homes had slackened up. President Haas at once appointed a committee to work out the details of a National "Buy a Home-First" campaign, the principal purposes of which is to popularize the good old-fashioned idea of "owning your own home."

The general plans adopted by the National Association were taken up by various progressive Realty Boards throughout the country and the propaganda spread and the enthusiasm created was contagious, for other industries sized up the idea and the campaign which is nation wide is being worked out by good fellows everywhere who want their fellow men to realize the glory of being a home owner.

The lumbermen were quick to see the desirability of a "Buy a Home-First" campaign and a great movement which is being planned in 60 Florida towns will be handled by lumbermen alone. The world's greatest lumber journal, The American Lumberman, is giving whole pages to the development of the idea and last week they devoted the entire front page to an article on "Build a Home."

Every day the committee receives word regarding some new town that is opening a campaign and when it is remembered that at the present writing 100 towns are already in the whirl of a "Buy a Home-First" movement, the scope of the work can be realized.

The announcement that the government will build one hundred and fifty 3600 ton boats in Portland during the next twelve months brings to our minds some idea of the money that is going to be put into circulation there. We must get ready for good times. Never will the spendthrift be so busy and it is up to us to convert him. Our campaign is going to have great influence upon the lives of our citizens, it will keep money home for the purchase of necessities and prevent to a great extent the flow of money out of Oregon into the hands of the purveyors of luxuries. The basic principles of thrift will be drilled into the minds of old and young and Portland is going to be a better city as a result of our work.

The local campaign will start with a big write-up in the Sunday papers of May 6th and throughout the month the slogan "Buy a Home-First" will be burned into the minds of Portland people until it will be mighty embarrassing not to own a home.
