#### Circuit Court.

Judge G. R. Bagley convened the May term of the circuit court on Monday, which proved to be a short session, the desire of the judge being to allow the jurymen to return to their work as soon as possible.

A grand jury was drawn composed of Charles Ray (foreman), M. L. Barber, H. A. Kinnaman, George Tinnerstet, A. L. Mapes, Henry A. Brandt and W. C. Trombley. There was only one matter that the grand jury inquired into, which did not justify an indictment, so the jury was excused for the present.

Judge Bagley excused the following jurymen: D. L. Peregoy (not a citizen), Frank Trout, P. A. Finne, Joe Kutcher (not served) E. F. Lyster, F. W. Kebbe, L. E. Curl and Ralph Welsh. A. G. Beals and W. A. Penner were excused until the adjourned session which will be held on June 9th. The other jurymen were excused on Tuesday until that date.

Wm. Tohl vs. H. F. Effenberger, executor. Transcript on appeal. Reversed.

A. A. Arstel, et al., vs. A. M. Hare, county judge, et al. Writ of review. The judge held that the proceedings were regular and gave judgment for the county, with cost. This was a case where the county constructed a road through Arstall's place.

#### Ranch Traded for \$105,000.

A. Henriksen, of Oakland, Ore., has traded his Oakland stock and grain ranch of 1750 acres to W. B. Ewing, of Cecil, Oregon, Mr. Henriksen gets an alfalfa ranch at Cecil, Ore., containing 600 acres, 300 acres of fine alfalfa land, and 2400 acres about 14 miles east of Heppner, which is grazing land. The alfalfa ranch has 200 acres in alfalfa and 100 more about ready for alfalfa. This is first class Willow Creek bottom land, and the most fertile land to be found anywhere in Oregon. The balance of this tract lies on the bench and is used for pasture. The other place which Mr. Henriksen gets is at the edge of the mountains East of Heppner, and is very good buckn grass range.

Mr. Henriksen expects to keep about 3000 sheep besides selling seven or eight tons of baled alfalfa hay on the ranches each year. It is considered the best ranch in Morrow county.

The deal was made through the Ralph Ackley Land Co., of Portland.
