Mrs. Mary Jane Lindsay was united in marriage to D. M. Oliver at Pt. Arena, Cal., in the year 1886. Two children, a son and daughter, have been born to this union. In the year 1891 the family removed to Tillamook, Oregon, where the home has been continuously for these 26 years.

Today there are left to mourn her passing from their circle her husband, D. M. Oliver, and children, viz: Mrs. Jones, and Mrs. Easie Mullin, of Tillamook; Mrs. Viola Mills of Redlands, Cal.; Edgar Lindsay, of Nehalem, Oregon; Walter Oliver, of Bay City, Oregon. Besides these of the immediate family there are 7 grandchildren, and a large number of friends and acquaintances of long standing.

In early life she made her profession of the Christian faith, and the quality of her life and character has ever been fruitful of good in the sphere of her influence. Her activities in a public way have been connected with the Ladies' Guild of the Presbyterian church. For seven years she has been a faithful member of the Daughters of Rebekah Morning Star Lodge, No. 52, an auxiliary relation with the I. O. O. F. and her sympathies have been loyally expressed many times in kindly ways.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 1 p.m. at the Presbyterian church, conducted by the pastor Rev. J. E. Youel, and burial was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, the Rebekah sisters using their beautiful ritualistic ceremony. The many friends attending the services was expressive of the deep sympathy of the community for the family.

#### WHY EVERY COUNTY SHOULD VOTE BONDS

There is an excellent reason why every voter in every county in the State outside of Multnomah County should vote for the \$6,000,000 road bond bill. Here it is:

Multnomah County has paved her roads. The \$6,000,000 paving fund will all be expended outside of Multnomah County. Multnomah County pays 40 per cent of the automobile license and the quarter-mill state road tax, which means she will pay 40 per cent of the \$6,000,000 bonds. Her contribution to the other counties for roads will be \$2,400,000.

Your county will get more back from these bonds than it will contribute.

#### WILL BE NO CHANCE TO JUGGLE THE BIDS

The State Highway Commission has formulated a general policy in the matter of letting contracts for road work in co-operation with the counties as contemplated in the \$6,000,000 road bond bill. It has been decided that the Commission sitting with the county court will let the contracts in the county in which the work is to be done. All bids are to be received on the day of award from the bidders or agents directly on the day of opening and read in the presence of the bidders. The object aimed at is to preclude any charge of the bids having been tampered with.

Farmers not residing on any of the roads to be improved under the road bond bill should not for that reason oppose the bond measure. With the approval by the voters of the bond issue, every such farmer will derive a two-fold benefit. In the first place, he will be brought that much closer to a hard-surfaced road. Secondly, the money now expended on the main roads will be available for the improvement of the connecting roads. Surely, the farmer, regardless of his residence with respect to the main trunk roads, cannot help but recognize that he will be benefited by the expenditure of funds raised by the proposed bond issue.

Young men are being continually urged to "Get back to the Farm," but they are expected to wade in mud up to their knees to get there. Vote for the \$6,000,000 bond measure and help make the farm more accessible to labor as well as to the markets.
