### MEN MUST REGISTER.

Between the Ages of 21 and 30 Years For War Census.

Portland, Ore., May 16.—Every man between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, must register on the day soon to be proclaimed by President Wilson for the war census.

There will be no exceptions to this rule. Even if a man belongs to one of the exempt classes, he nevertheless must register if he is between 21 and 30 years of age. The government will determine who is to be exempt after its records are complete.

Brigadier General George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon, working under the direction of Governor James Withycombe, has put the machinery to work and his first request is that he make a careful study of its provisions to eliminate all possible confusion at the polls.

Registering for the war census should be no more confusing than casting a vote. The general plan for gathering the data for the government is based on the ballot system. If every man is ready, War Census day will pass like clock work.

The man who tries to evade this provision will face a term in jail without the option of paying a fine. In almost every case throughout the state the census will be taken in the regular polling places used on election days.

Thurm Coulson Pleads Guilty and Pays Fine of \$150.00

Thurm Coulson, of Blaine, was arrested on a charge of manufacturing whiskey, and on Monday pleaded guilty. Justice Stanley fined him \$150 and costs, and sentenced him to ten days in jail, the latter being suspended on good behavior.

Coulson is the first person to be arrested in Tillamook County as a moonshiner. Sheriff Campbell was successful in locating a still used by Coulson, and it was found in the woods near Blaine. ### Bay City's Charter is Held Valid on Appeal.

Salem, Or., May 15.—In an opinion written by Justice Moore, the supreme court today pronounced the new charter of Bay City valid and also held that the present city officials were legally constituted officers. The proceeding to test the validity of the charter and also to determine whether or not the officials were legally holding their offices were instituted by District Attorney Goynne, of Tillamook county.

At a meeting called for last Thursday evening for the purpose of organizing a Red Cross for Tillamook County, about 50 persons assembled at the High School that evening when a temporary organization was formed, with Mrs. C. J. Edwards chairman and Mrs. A. C. Everson secretary. Twenty-five persons signified their intention of joining the Red Cross, and another meeting is to be held this (Thursday) evening, when the work will be more fully outlined, as set out by the state president, Dr. R. T. Boals gave an account of the origin and development of the Red Cross movement, and Rev. Lacy, pastor of the M. E. Church spoke of the great work done by the Red Cross.

It is hoped that there will be a good attendance at the meeting this evening, for Tillamook County should have a good strong chapter of the Red Cross.

### Militiamen to Get Pay.

Checks for payment of members of the Tenth and Twelfth Companies, Oregon Coast Artillery, for their drills in August and September, 1916, were received from the War Department by Adjutant-General George A. White, of the Oregon National Guard.

The amount sent for the Tenth Company which is stationed at Tillamook, is \$1,395.91, to be divided among 60 men who have qualified for payment by attending the required number of drills. The checks for the Twelfth Company stationed at Hood River, total \$1,612.87 to be divided among 73 men.
