### Circuit Court in Session.

Judge G. R. Bagley convened the adjourned term of the circuit court on Monday and several cases have been disposed of this week.

Sandborn-Cutting Co. vs. J. W. Butler and C. F. Stone. This was a jury trial and a verdict of \$126.79 was rendered in favor of the plaintiff, the costs and disbursements amounting to \$123.80.

Louis Weinhard, et al, vs. F. H. Astmann et al. Default and decree.

State of Oregon vs. P. J. Sharp. This was a case where Sharp was indicted by the grand jury for unlawful manufacture of intoxicating liquors, who pleaded guilty and was fined \$50.

W. B. Alderman vs. Henry Becker and Mary Becker. Plaintiff claimed \$715.00 for the sale of an auto to defendant. Jury trial and a verdict in favor of plaintiff for the amount.

American Can Co., vs. Oregon Fisheries Company. Action for money. Dismissed.

Wheeler Lumber Co., vs. Oregon Fisheries Co. Action for money. Judgment.

The Adjustment Bureau of the Portland Association of Credit Men vs. E. E. Yarnell and F. J. Yarnell. Foreclosure. Default and decree.

Nell Rassmussen vs. A. M. Hare, F. L. Owens and Geo. R. McKimms is a case being tried before a jury in which the plaintiff claims damages as the result of an alleged accident to the plaintiff, who claimed that she was injured in crossing over some plank near her home. The plaintiff first sued the county, but failing in that a suit was brought against the county officials as individuals.

### PATRIOTIC DEMONSTRATION

Come to Tillamook City on the 4th and Help Cheer the Tillamook Boys.

The patriotic demonstration in this city on the Fourth is for the purpose of giving everybody an opportunity to join in the demonstration and to cheer the boys belonging to the 10th Company, Coast Artillery, before they entrain for active service, which will be the latter part of July. It may be several years before they return, especially if they are sent to France, and this may be the last opportunity the people of Tillamook county will have of showing their appreciation of the Tillamook boys before they leave, for there is no telling what the fortunes or misfortunes of war have in store for them. We all hope and pray that they will return safely to Tillamook, but in these strenuous times, and with so many serious difficulties to contend with no one can tell what is going to happen. So this is the time for the home city and home county to do honor to the Tillamook boys in volunteering their services in this national crisis.

The patriotic demonstration will not be confined to the G. A. R. and W. R. C., but the business men, Women's Civic Improvement League and Honor Girls will take a prominent part as a guard of honor to the Tillamook boys, as well as any other organizations from outside the city, giving everybody an opportunity to join in.

The committee having the patriotic demonstration in hand request all business men to join in the demonstration and march with the business men as they did at the opening of the Fair last year. Business houses with the exception of fruit stands etc. are to be closed between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. so as to give every body an opportunity to show their patriotism and join in the demonstration. The Women's Civic Improvement League and the Honor Guard Girls will also take part.

The Tillamook Hose Company held their regular business meeting June 14 at the City Hall, and the following resolution was adopted and a copy sent to the city council.

Resolved that the Tillamook Hose Co. recommend the City Council to as follows: approximately, auto-

mobile truck with 40 gallon chemical tank, bed capacity to hold 800 feet of hose, ladders, chemical hose, and other equipment. Estimated cost of entire outfit \$1,000.
