Rockaway Wide-Awake.
 Dear Mr. Editor.—Do you know what a wide awake, enterprising little neighbor you have here in Rockaway? I have only been here two weeks, fixing up my summer cottage, and they have organized a Red Cross Auxiliary with seventeen annual and two subscribing charter members; formed a regular semi-weekly military drill with Mr. Best as leader and eight boys enthusiastically handling their rifles; hewn from the wood, painted, quilt-balled and set up a flag pole at the church, raised money for the flag, had a flag raising and as patriotic a Red Cross Sunday as any church in the land. Now isn't that going some? And its resident work, too, which is what interests me, for I've been watching the beach grow since before the railroad was through. Just a word about the Red Cross Society. They are proud to have as their chairman, a real Red Cross nurse, Mrs. Bolting, of Saltair, waiting for, ready for, a call, if need be. She gave an interesting account of the training and duties of a Red Cross nurse, as part of the program last night. The work of the choir, Miss Dolly Wingrove's recitation "To the Flag", Mrs. Miller's reading were all most praiseworthy; and highly appreciated was the eulogy to the flag given by Lester Maroney, of Washington University, when the flag was raised. This is not Mr. Maroney's first effort here and the people always hear him gladly and are proud of him as one of their own. Little Helen Perry bravely recited a cheer to Old Glory, and with song and prayer the dear stars and stripes fluttered out on the evening air, raised by George Jones, a soldier boy at home over Sunday. Miss Emma B. Penfield a member of the Forest Grove auxiliary, gave a sketch of Red Cross history, its work in the past, its present organization and future aims. A good collection was taken up for the Red Cross work. Best of all the beach turned out pretty much en masse to honor the flag raising, and the company gathered enjoyed not only the program so well prepared under Mrs. Burdick's leadership, but also the extremely fitting and lovely decorations under Mr. Jones' direction. Mr. Jones, indeed, did much of the work himself, completing the portier effect of flags and red crosses which hung against a background of green massed to the ceiling. The delicate beauty of the wild huckleberry in profusion relieved the side walls, a beautiful floral piece—a red cross on a white ground, designed by Mr. Jones and executed by Mrs. Burdick, stood on the pulpit, a great bunch of red and white roses nestled in hower of green, balancing the organ, both flag draped. There isn't the slightest doubt that Rockaway is patriotic, and has her share of talent to show it. Public thanks are certainly due to all who so generously helped with time, money and talent to make Red Cross Sunday a success. We had many Tillamook visitors in town Sunday. We should be glad to see them any Sunday at the services held in the church, Sunday School at 10 a.m. Evening service at 8 p.m. and after July 1, morning service at 11 a.m. It certainly is a beautiful drive along the Tillamook beaches and Rockaway church will give you a hearty welcome always.


