The Tillamook Homing Club finished their series of old bird races on Sunday with a fly from Lyle, Wash. The birds were liberated at 11:45. The first five birds which were owned by W. S. Coates, Joe Mills and W. Foster arrived together at 4:18. This is considered a good fly for the birds in their first year as they had to cross both the Cascades and the Coast Range. The club will fly a series of young bird races in August.

Miss Sara Prentiss, formerly of Tillamook, but now of Corvallis, has accepted a position in the Domestic Science Department of the Oregon Agricultural College. Mrs. Prentiss was graduated from the above college in the class of 1917. She was an honor student and according to the Registrar's report, the most brilliant student in the Home Economics Department this year. Her work will be conducted in Mothercraft, food preparation and housewifery.

The new theatre building opposite the Tillamook Hotel is rapidly nearing completion. With the opening of this fine photoplay house Tillamook people will have in their midst one of the most modern up-to-date places in the Northwest. New seats and new equipment will be put in, which will make everything new and inviting, and should make it a very popular place for the people to find an evening's high-class entertainment. Partridge and Morrison will operate the place which is a guarantee in itself that all will be high class.

There is every prospect of a telegraphic message being received at any moment from Washington awarding Feeney-Bremer Co. a contract to build two vessels for the government, all the preliminary details having been worked out satisfactory with recommendations from the Portland and Seattle offices. As soon as a telegraphic message is received that will mean that Feeney-Bremer Co. will have to get to work immediately and not wait until the contract is signed. The company has selected a site for the ship yard on the Elmore property at Dick's point, on the corner of the south side of the bay.

The Ladies of the Women's Civic Improvement League, with the assistance of the girls of the Honor Guard, conducted a tag campaign for the Company Fund of the Coast Artillery on the Fourth, which proved successful, \$100.00 being collected. The dance given at the Armory net-

ted about \$60.00, and with the addition of \$20.00 given by Miss Lillian Groat, who gave the money that was intended to purchase a dress for the goddess, with the balance left over from the Fourth of July fund and some additional subscriptions will result in swelling the Company fund \$250.00. Some of the business men are going to interest themselves in increasing the company fund, and, if possible, make it \$1,000.00. That is one of the many ways in which we can show our appreciation of our home boys, whom we all admire and respect. On the Fourth H. H. Rosenberg handed the President of the Commercial Club, a check for \$10.00 and a like amount having been also subscribed, the two checks were turned over to Mrs. Stanley Coates of the Women's Civic Improvement League, to help swell the receipts taken in that day for the Company Fund.

**Opening of Sour Grass Road.**  
 The opening of the Sour Grass road at a picnic on Saturday was fittingly observed near the county line in Yamhill County. There was a large number of persons present both from Yamhill and Tillamook counties. The grove was packed with autos, and being an ideal day, those who attended had a most pleasant day's enjoyment.  
 This road was built by Yamhill and Tillamook counties, which formed a joint road district for that purpose. The road is a great benefit to both counties, and cost in the neighborhood of \$45,000. Although four miles of the road is in Yamhill county and only one mile in Tillamook county, both counties put up like amounts for its construction, with some state aid. The road is not only graded, but is rocked with a good top dressing well rolled, and on Saturday the road was in fine shape and almost equal to a hard surface road to travel.  
 After the picnic lunch D. L. Shrode acted as toastmaster. He impressed the audience that the Sour Grass road was a State road and was part of the Portland, Astoria, Tillamook, McMinnville loop. The first speaker was Governor James Withycombe who gave two rattling speeches. The governor's remarks were on patriotism and good roads. He said he did not think that the people realized the seriousness of the world wide war that the United States was engaged in and the sacrifices that would have to be made before the war lords of Germany were subdued. He appealed to everybody to do their bit and support and back up President Wilson. He said the United States was not fighting the German people, but Kaiserism. The governor was pleased with what Oregon had done in obtaining volunteers and money for the liberty bonds and the Red Cross campaign, and he was frequently applauded during the fine patriotic address that he made. The governor was quite enthusiastic when it came to talking about good roads. He was greatly pleased with the Sour Grass road and paid Tillamook and Yamhill counties a great compliment at the completion of that road, and he was more than pleased to know that the people of Tillamook county had voted three to one for state bonds and Yamhill county two to one. He spoke highly of the State Highway Commission and he said he believed he had appointed a good commission who would spend the money to the best advantage. He predicted before many years that there would be other bond measures for good roads, for Oregon was far behind other states

 At the close of the speaking, Governor Withycombe and the members of the Yamhill County Court were arrested and brought into court and lined up before the toastmaster. The first person to receive a little advice was the governor. The toastmaster said he was a little disappointed that the State Highway Commission was not present, for the Tillamook Commercial Club had planned a little surprise. The Governor was presented with a Young American, and in making the presentation, Mr. Shrode said if the Governor's State Highway Commission would build as good roads as Tillamook County made good cheese no one would have any complaint to make, and in presenting three Young Americans to the county Judge and County Commissioners of Yamhill county, said that the Sour Grass Road brought the two counties closer together and it would not be long, with a hard surfaced road, before hay, etc., would be shipped into Tillamook County from Yamhill county by auto trucks.  
 Governor Withycombe was so pleased with the cheese that he made another talk and spoke highly of Tillamook cheese, when he was presented with another.

**Red Clover Factory Destroyed.**  
 Fire on Tuesday morning completely wiped out the Red Clover Cheese Factory. The fire started on the roof, presumably by a spark falling on it. The cheese maker made an effort to extinguish the fire with a bucket of water but he had to make a hasty retreat from the roof, as the fire had taken a firmer hold on the building than he realized. Some of the cheese was saved but otherwise the factory and contents were completely destroyed, including the furniture and effects belonging to W. J. De Boer and Orvil White. The loss is somewhere about \$6,000 with \$3,000 insurance. The factory will be rebuilt as soon as possible and in the meantime the milk is being distributed around to other factories.

**Shingle Mill at Wheeler Burns.**  
 Wheeler, Or.,—July 1.—The Jensen shingle mill at this city was destroyed by fire this morning, loss \$10,000 no insurance. The mill was of three-machine capacity and was shipping two to four cars of shingles each week.  
 The adjoining lumber mill plant was saved. This fire is a big blow to the shingle industry of this district, and leaves a large crew of skilled workmen without employment. Mr. Jensen left for Portland today to try to raise funds for rebuilding his mill.
