Two children were born to the union. Plaintiff asks for the custody of the children and a reasonable allowance for their and her support.

Plaintiff asks the custody of the child. Judge Bagley granted a divorce giving defendant permission to visit the child.

## FARMERS HELD BY COMPENSATION LAW

Supreme Court Rules Immunity Applies Only When Notice is Given.

Salem, Ore., July 17.—If a farmer operates any hazardous machine or agency that comes within the purview of the workmen's compensation law, he will not be immune from its provisions, unless he notifies the industrial accident commission that he will not be governed by them, the supreme court held today in the case of Wesley Raney vs. Industrial Accident Commission appellant. The opinion was written by Justice Moore in affirmation of Circuit Judge Bagley Tillamook County, and is considered important.

Raney had his left hand severed in an ensilage mill, and the commission rejected his request for damages on the theory that the business in which he was injured was incidentally connected with farming, and that farming is not treated as a hazardous occupation. The court, in part said: Where, however, a person engaged in farming operates for himself or another any machine or agency that the statute has declared brings such employer automatically within hazardous occupations, unless he has given in the manner prescribed notice that he will not be governed by provisions of the act, he is not immune from making to the industrial accident commission small contributions which the law exacts."

Judge Bagley's conclusions of law in this case was:

That the defendants in rejecting the plaintiffs claim for compensation failed to consider the facts concerning the said injury, and failed to construe the law and facts pertaining thereto correctly.

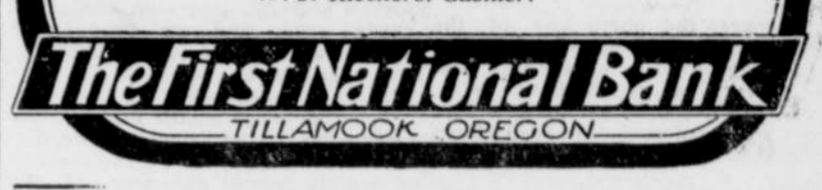

section 13 of the Workmen's Compensation act, and that said Tinnerstet at the time of the accident was engaged in one of those hazardous occupations as defined by section 13 and was in all respects subject to said act.

The plaintiff is entitled to the following compensation under said Workmen's Compensation Act on account of said injury, to-wit: \$25.00 per month for a period of 76 months, beginning July 1st, 1916, and the sum of \$100.00 expended by him as doctor and hospital bill on account of said injury, and his costs and disbursements of this proceedings.

That the order of defendants in rejecting plaintiff's said claim for compensation should be reversed, and a decree entered directing the defendants to allow claim and to pay the same in the manner provided by law.

Fourteen counties and the city of Portland will not have to contribute anyone to the first draft of the war army, if the unofficial statement is correct that Oregon's net quota will be 717. The allocation of quotas on the 717 basis, as worked out by Adjutant General White, shows that the following will not be called on for men in the first drawing: Benton, Coos, Crook, Douglas, Hood River, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill Counties and Portland.
