

**TILLAMOOK COUNTY
REBEKAH CONVENTION**

**A Most Successful Gathering Held at
Beaver on Monday.**

The Tillamook County 11th annual Rebekah Convention of District No. 18, convened on Monday at the I. O. O. F. hall at Beaver, Oregon. The convention was called to order by County Chairman, Sister A. W. Bunn. The ceremonies were introduced by a patriotic salute to "Old Glory," and the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner."

The official chairs were occupied as follows: Sister A. W. Bunn, of Beaver Rebekah Lodge, Chairman; Sister Frances B. Stranahan, of Morning Star Rebekah Lodge, Vice-Chairman; Sister May Maddux, of Morning Star Rebekah Lodge, Secretary; Sister H. M. Farmer, of Beaver Rebekah Lodge, Chaplain; Sister Florence Aschim, of Morning Star Rebekah Lodge, Conductor; Sister Hope Watson, of Morning Star Rebekah Lodge, Marshal; Sister Nellie Sappington, of Ocean Spray Rebekah Lodge, Inside Guardian; and Brother Woods, of Beaver Rebekah Lodge, Outside Guardian.

The opening ceremonies were immediately followed by the introduction to the convention of State President of the Rebekah Assembly of Oregon, Sister Mary A. Lankaster, of Astoria. The address of welcome was made by Bro. Herman Farmer and response was made by Bro. Rollie Watson. Appropriate remarks were made by the president Sister Lankaster.

During the morning session various committees were appointed. Roll call of various lodges in the county reported delegates in attendance, Bay City Unity Rebekah Lodge No. 51, Tillamook Morning Star Rebekah Lodge No. 52, Beaver Rebekah Lodge, No. 299, and Cloverdale Ocean Spray Lodge No. 148. Before the close of the morning session a motion was made that Tillamook city be the next place for the Annual Convention, which motion was duly carried, unanimously. Morning session of the convention adjourned at 12:45 o'clock for dinner, which had been beautifully provided for in the banquet hall, where all adjourned to partake of a fine chicken dinner. The tables were loaded with the weight of good things provided for the occasion.

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:45 o'clock, when the reports of the various committees and the various lodges of the county were received and read, showing a very healthy condition of the Rebekah lodges throughout the county. The election of officers took place when the following officers were elected for the 1918 convention: Sister Frances B. Stranahan, chairman; Sister Millie Sappington, vice-chairman; Sister May Maddux, secretary; Sister Goldsworthy, marshal; Sister Lena Gilbert, conductor; Sister Margaret Wilson, inside guardian; Sister Lizzie Churchill, outside guardian; and Sister Hope Watson, chaplain.

The afternoon session was interspersed with a program consisting of instrumental and vocal selections, and several good speeches on the welfare of the order and our patriotic duty to our country. A question box suggestive of lodge procedure, etc., was introduced, and a number of questions asked and intelligently disposed of for the good of the order. The President introduced the proposition of perfection of secret work of letter perfect interpretation, stating that a certificate of perfection would be issued to each member of the order who exemplified the secret work letter perfect. The first member to give the work was Sister Shoemaker, of Beaver Lodge, which work met with well deserved applause. A number of Sisters tried the work, but in some ways were not perfect, but a large number qualified for certificates before the convention closed, as follows: Frances B. Stranahan, Rose Williams and May E. Maddux, of Morning Star Rebekah Lodge; Marie Shoemaker, Lena Gilbert and Margaret Wilson, of Beaver Rebekah Lodge; and Millie Sappington, of Ocean Spray Rebekah Lodge.

The Rebekah Convention closed at 5:45 and was voted one of the best conventions ever held in Tillamook County as to results obtained and the welfare of the order.

The evening session of the Beaver Lodge was called to order at 8:30 o'clock, there being over eighty members present, when the work of the Rebekah Lodge was exemplified by the drill team of the Beaver lodge. One candidate was initiated into the mystic circle.

One feature of the work worthy of comment was the fact that from the opening ceremony to the closing of the lodge, and throughout all the degree work, no ritual was used, each and every officer and member of the degree staff having their work committed to memory, and at the close of the lodge this brought forth worthy comment from the large number of visitors present, as well as the worthy President, Sister Lankaster, who was very much pleased with the work.

This Tillamook County Rebekah Convention will pass into history of the order as the most successful ever held in the county. The Beaver Sisters and Brothers were to be congratulated for the able and efficient manner in which they provided for visitors. The hall was tastefully decorated with roses, sweet peas and fern in profusion. The altar of the Noble Grand being entwined with garlands of scarlet flowers and the windows and corners of the hall a profusion of sweet peas and fern. "Old Glory" was conspicuously displayed behind the chair of the Noble Grand, as well as a large and beautiful flag on a staff in the corner of the hall. The tables in the dining room and every conceivable place were decorated with a profusion of blossoms. The good things provided for the various banquets are too numerous to mention, but sufficient to say that there was more than plenty and then some for everybody.

We wish to place special emphasis to the adaptability and versatility in every condition met and disposed of by the worthy President, Sister Lan-

kaster, who has her whole heart and soul in the grand work of Oddfellowship, and she certainly endeared herself to the fraternity in Tillamook County, during her visit. She is an inspiration and a guiding star for the advancement of the noble work of the order, and we prophesy great results to materialize in the future from the spirit of her work.

AGRICULTURE NOTES.

Canning and Drying Demonstration To Come this Month.

One of the Home Science demonstrators from O. A. C. will be in the county sometime this month to demonstrate the best methods to use in canning and drying fruits, vegetables and meats. In this year of food shortage it is very important that everything be saved for later use that it is possible to save.

Our grandmothers dried vegetables long before they knew how to can them. Jars and cans are high priced this year and drying is coming into vogue again.

The demonstrator will show a simple home made evaporator that any handy man can make and will give instructions how to use it to obtain the best results. Almost anything can be dried from greens and carrots to berries. It can be stored in pasteboard boxes and the water added to it before cooking next winter.

The exact date of the demonstration will be announced later.

Notice to Contractors—Paving and Grading Tillamook County.

Sealed bids for paving and grading five miles of Tillamook-Cloverdale route in Tillamook County, Oregon, 16 feet in width, commencing at a point three miles south of Tillamook City at the end of the present pavement, and continuing to Section 264 over the present old grade, will be received at the office of the State Highway Commission, Salem, Oregon, until 1 o'clock p.m. on the 7th day of August, 1917.

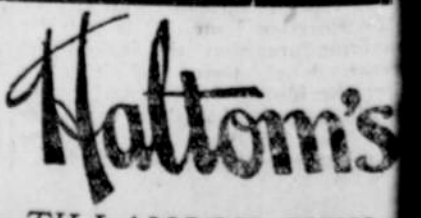
