### Red Cross Work to Start.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Todd, the room formerly occupied by the Lamar Variety Store has been secured as a work room for women who are interested in working for the Red Cross. Sewing machines and other equipment have been donated. The room will be open Wednesdays and Fridays from two-thirty until five o'clock so that anyone who has a little time to give to the work may find an opportunity. Some one in charge will give needed information and instructions, and it is hoped that there will be a liberal response and that Tillamook will be well represented in this work, which is being done throughout the United States.

It is desired also that attention be called to the fact that much old material of no further use in homes, may be of value in making articles to be sent out. Old flour sacks may be used as dish towels. Old muslin is used in making handkerchiefs, regulation size 18 inches square; old table linen may be used for napkins, hemmed, 14 inches square, or for tray cloth, 15 by 22 inches hemmed; bed socks are made from any warm material—pattern may be seen at work room; shoulder wrap, made of two yards of outing flannel or other warm material, is used in hospitals for patients who are able to sit up. A number of knitted articles, socks, mufflers, wristlets, helmets, sponges and wash cloth are very badly needed and all who can help with any of this work are urgently requested to call for instructions and patterns.

Do not forget to save all material that can be used in any way. Gun wipes of any soft material, 2 by 3 inches, done in packages of 100 are requested. Patterns of housewives and comfort bags, essentials in each

### Sheriff Arrests Petty Thieves.

Sheriff Campbell succeeded in rounding up two petty thieves who have been operating for a long time, and who may be implicated in some of the petty thefts that have been going on in this city for a long time. The thieves are two young men by the names of T. R. Fraser and Paschel Frazer. They are brothers and live on Tillamook river, where they own 40 acres of land. Two charges were filed against Paschel Frazer and one against T. R. Frazer, who were accused of stealing feed, a tent and tools from A. Arstitt. They both pleaded guilty and Justice Stanley imposed a fine of \$50.00 upon T. R. Frazer and a fine of \$100.00 against Paschel Frazer. T. R. Frazer paid his fine and Paschel Frazer is locked up in the county jail, and if the fine is not paid in a day or two, Sheriff Campbell expects to put him to work on the county road. These young men are fortunate in getting off so lightly, for charges could have been preferred against them for burglaries, which would have sent them to the penitentiary for a term of years. The sheriff is endeavoring to connect them with several robberies in this city, and he is inclined to believe they stole a dozen cans of preserved meat he found on a boat house. Anyone who lost canned meat should confer with the sheriff.
