If Germany Should Win

In his extremely blunt manner George Bernard Shaw told his Fabian comrades the undeniable truth when he said "you may take it from me that if the Germans beat us in this war they will skin us alive."

Germany is going to take all she can. That may be considerable if the United States fails to exert its energies effectively. We are inclined too often to believe the opposite in this country. Some people seem to think that a victorious Germany would deal gently with America. Nothing in the present matters in Germany, in the record of war itself, supports such credulity.

As a matter of truth, if Germany wins the United States will pay the bills. We shall pay for ourselves and for our allies. Every acre, every dollar, every privilege and advantage which it is possible to extort will be taken. That is the sore prospect. The more quickly we realize it the sooner Teutonic triumph will be rendered impossible. The Kaiser did not force war upon the world from sporting motives. Germany is frankly "on the make."

How the Submarines Stand

For the 22 weeks since the British admiralty has been announcing submarine sinkings the weekly average for British ships over 1600 tons has been almost exactly 20, with an index of 30,000 tons. Adding the smaller ships, we get another 7000 tons, perhaps. A weekly rate of 100,000 tons explains why in Germany there submarine must have plenty of time to be justified in its works. On the other hand, Britain does face the prospect of losing close to five million tons a year unless the submarine menace is met more successfully than has hitherto been the case.

If we take the 22-week period and divide it in two, we find that the loss in British large ships for the first period has been at the rate of 21 a week, and in the second period at a rate of 18 per week. This shows plainly that no sovereign power has as yet been discovered, though an increased allied effort is indicated in a declining rate in the face of the presumably increasing number of U-boats.

The situation is exactly as Admiral Jellicoe described it: "The Germans have not mastered us, but on the other hand we have not mastered the U-boats."

Men of Twenty-nine Beware!

If a man is going to commit a crime during his lifetime the chances are that he will do it at the age of 29. It is a curious fact that statistics have shown that man is more dangerous at that period of his life than at any other.

The general supposition is that man have attained the highest development of their mental and physical powers at 29, and they are supposed to be able to distinguish between right and wrong and to realize the consequences liable to follow the indulgence of either.

Next to the age of 29, the greatest number of criminals have been aged 21, 27 or 45 years.—London Tit Bits.

Increasing Demand for Oil

One of the greatest national needs is an increasing supply of crude oil and its chief product—gasoline and distillate—caused by our entry into the European war.

Besides transportation of troops and supplies by land and sea, the army will need 35,000 motor trucks, thousands of aeroplanes, submarines, submarine chasers, etc. etc.

Germany could not enter upon her terrible submarine campaign for lack of oil supplies for submarine engines, until she had developed the big oil fields of Galicia and Roumania.

What a lesson for our government, where the production of our crude oil increased steadily until last year, when it fell back under the batteries of the oil producers in the federal courts.

Total crude productions in 1915 reached 306,484,728 barrels in our country, and with demand almost doubling fell off to 303,462,887 barrels in 1916, and oil in storage May 1, 1917, was 165,688,797, as against 174,380,500 barrels in storage Jan. 1, 1917.

In January, February, and March, 1917, 72,873,062 barrels crude oil were produced, while we consumed 82,899,202 barrels in the same months, or at the rate of 331,596,868 barrels a year.

The facts show that the production of crude oil for the past three years has remained practically stationary while increased demand has eaten up storage.
