mind and plan to be there. This industry will mean thousands of dollars to Tillamook County and will not interfere with the other industries now under way, as it will come almost altogether from land that is at present non-productive. You are paying taxes on that land right now and not getting a cent back. This is not good business. If you have all you can tend to with your dairy herd, make an offer to someone who does not have so much income and give them a chance to make good on the land that is doing you no good. Meeting dates will be announced later. Watch for them and come.

Tillamook Cow Testing Association Report for August.

738 cows were on test in the Association for the month of August. Of this number 112 produced over 40 pounds butter fat and 44 qualified for the honor roll of 45 pound cows. This contrasted with last year's August report of 193, 40 pound cows and 75 over 45 pound seems to indicate that little improvement is being made unless conditions are understood. Last year, grass conditions were at their best and there was consequently little difference between the production in August and May, usually earlier than usual, found a majority of the best month. The dry weather, coming at it did, this year, a month earlier than usual, found the majority of the farmers unprepared with green feed or silage to supplement the short pastures so that many otherwise patriotic cows were forced for the time being, to become slackers. The recent rains will probably save the day for all pastures and with the better production in the spring months the Association should have a better average than last year, in spite of the dry weather.

The grain question is getting to be a serious one. Prices have almost doubled over last year at this time. Farmers, without silage or roots have depended quite generally upon beet pulp but find that it will cost up to \$40 per ton this year, and only a limited supply at that, where last year it was secured at \$25 to \$28. It is hoped that the price of mill feed will be materially reduced as a result of the feed control bill. The feeds generally fed here with the present local prices are as follows: bran \$42, shorts \$44, barley and oat shorts \$43 and alfalfa molasses feed \$36.

At the Tillamook County Fair, just closed, Association members were strong prize winners, one member took home \$170 in prize money and two others about \$150 each. First and second in the milk production contest went to Mr. Kunze, president of the association. It might be said that Mr. Kunze has two fine bull calves for sale from these two cows. Both cows are two year olds, one having an association record of 47 lb fat in her fifth month after calving. The other one, Mechthilde Pontiac Longfield, is making a creditable record in the association. This cow's dam has a semi official record of 1033 pounds in a year.

The high herd fat average for the month is held by Cary & O'Brien with four cows producing an average of 798.25 pounds milk and 44.33 lbs fat. The highest milk average goes to Chas. Kunze with a 965.24 lb. average for 34 cows. The lowest herd made an average of 499.9 lbs. milk and 22.68 lbs. fat. This again shows the contrast between good breeding and non-descript breeding. The high herds are the results of years of careful selection, through testing, and the use of sires from high producing ancestry. In the latter case a pure bred sire has never been kept and this is the first year of testing.

The Association average for the month was 690 lbs. milk and 31.1 lbs fat.
