## Another Divorce Suit.

Sedy Wiedemann vs Carl L. Weidemann is a divorce suit filed in the Circuit Court. These parties were married in Vancouver, Wash., on July 22 1914. No children have been born to the union. The plaintiff alleges cruel and inhuman treatment, the defendant using intoxicating liquors to excess while they resided in Portland, who often came home drunk and abused plaintiff, accusing her of undue intimacy with other men. On or about the 15 of August, 1915, in Portland, he did not come home for supper and she phoned a saloon where defendant was accustomed to spend much of his time, and upon his coming to the phone, plaintiff could tell he was drunk, and wanted to bring his brother home with him, also drunk and put him to bed. Plaintiff told her husband to go to the brother's own home, and then came home to supper, which was still waiting. Defendant finally came home alone, and drunk and abusive, assailed plaintiff, struck her, tore her hair, and finally endeavored to hit her on the head with a chair. Plaintiff ran from the house to a neighbors and called for the police. When the policeman came, she went home to defendant, and found the door locked, and the defendant sitting at a table with a loaded revolver in his hand, threatened to shoot either her or the policeman if they entered the house. She finally had to go to one of the neighbors and stay all night, and the whole disgraceful scene was in the daily papers next day.

## Jersey Sale of Registered Cattle.

At the dispersal sale of registered Jersey cattle, consisting of 19 head of cows, heifers and bull calves owned by T. Withycombe & Son and auctioned off to the highest bidder, at the County Fair grounds on last Saturday, a large attendance was present at this sale and on some of the offerings some very spirited bidding was done.

This animal was a beautiful Fontaine cow of pure Island breeding. Her dam and granddam are great cows; her granddam has a test of over 21 lbs. of butter in seven days, and was full sister to Golden Jolly, which sold for \$12,000. This cow is a heavy and persistent milker. A very spirited bidding was in evidence when this animal was brought into the ring.

## CELEBRATES ADVENT OF A NEW INDUSTRY.

Contract Signed Up to Build One Government Vessel at Tillamook.  
On Saturday evening the business men of Tillamook city got together at the Hotel Tillamook for the purpose of celebrating the advent of a new industry into Tillamook County and to show its appreciation to the Portland Chamber of Commerce for the assistance that that organization gave in helping to secure the contract.  
W. D. B. Dodson, Secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, with Mrs. Dodson, were in the city, and they were made the honored guests of the occasion. It was a representative gathering of business men and their wives, and the gathering would have been much larger had it been on any other night than Saturday. However, every seat in the large dining room was filled, several of the young ladies of the city waited at the banquet.  
D. L. Shrode acted as toastmaster. Mayor R. T. Boals was the first speaker who advocated the improvement of the channel to Tillamook City, and he looked upon this as one of the most important things for the development of this city and this part of the county.  
Fred C. Baker, President of the Tillamook Commercial Club stated that the meeting was for the purpose of showing its appreciation of the assistance of the Portland Chamber of Commerce gave Tillamook in securing a contract for government vessels, and especially to Mr. Dodson, its secretary, who had interested himself in behalf of Tillamook. This was Mr. Dodson's first visit to Tillamook and the best part of Oregon.  
The other speakers were C. J. Edwards, Prof. Kirk, R. W. Watson, H. T. Bots, S. S. Johnson, Webster Holmes, J. Feeny, and J. C. Langille, all of whom expressed their appreciation of the efforts of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and to Mr. Dodson. Some of the speakers were strong advocates of wooden ships. Mr. Feeny read a letter stating that the government had signed a contract for one ship, and this brought forth a vociferous applause.  
Mr. Dodson was surprised at the flattering reception given him. He felt glad that the people of Tillamook appreciated the efforts of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, for it was not often that that body received thanks from localities that had been benefitted by its efforts and for that reason he was most pleased to know that Tillamook people showed its appreciation, for it had been several years since the Portland Chamber of Commerce had received any such thanks from other localities. Mr. Dodson touched on the great work the Portland Chamber of Commerce is doing to make this a greater Oregon and the development of the whole state. He paid a high tribute to James Feeny who had been most persistent in his endeavors to secure a contract and the success that followed was largely due to him.  
After Mr. Dodson had spoken, the toast master appointed Attorney Bots to conduct him to the head of the table, and to show him in a more tangible manner how the Tillamook Commercial Club appreciated the efforts of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Dodson was presented with one of Tillamook county's famous cheese.

## BAYOCEAN TROUBLE NEW.

Natorium Company Sues Potter Realty Company.  
Dissatisfied stockholders in the Bayocean Natatorium Company, through their attorneys, Ridgeway & Johnson, brought suit in the Multnomah county Circuit court against the T. B. Potter Realty Company and S. B. Vincent, its receiver, for \$70,000. The officers of the defendant company are charged with fraud in the misrepresentation of the value of property that was turned over in payment of its share of the stock in the natatorium corporation.  
It is charged in the complaint that the officers and directors of the T. B. Potter Realty Company, in promoting the sale of real estate owned by that company at Bayocean, decided to establish a large natatorium at that point as a further inducement to prospective investors. The officers and directors of the realty company, it is alleged, organized the Bayocean Natatorium Company with a capital stock of \$150,000 retaining 50 per cent of the stock and the controlling interest, the remaining \$75,000 of stock being offered to the general public.  
Representing that the property was worth \$75,000, the amount of stock it voted itself, the realty company turned over to the newly formed company five lots at Bayocean, a lighting plant and an electric franchise, in full payment for its stock. The complainants allege that the value of the property so delivered to the natatorium corporation actually did not exceed \$5,000. They ask judgment for the difference, or \$70,000.
