BAYOCEAN TROUBLE NEW.

Natatorium Company Sues Potter Realty Company.

Dissatisfied stockholders in the Bayocean Natatorium Company, C ompany, through their attorneys, and Ridgeway & Johnson, brought suit in the Multnomah county Circuit court against the T. B. Potter Realty Company and B. Vincent, its receiver, for \$70, 000. The officers of the defendant company are charged with fraud in the misrepresentation of the value of property that was turned over in payment of its share of the stock in the natatorium corporation.

It is charged in the complaint that the officers and directors of the T. B. C. A. Elliott vs R. A. Connell and Potter Realty Company, in promoting the sale of real estate owned by that company at Bayocean, decided that point as a further inducement to prospective investors. The officers and directors of the realty company, it is alleged, organized the Bayocean cent of the stock and the controlling \$75,000 stock being offered to the general

Representing that the property was worth \$75,000, the amount of stock it voted itself, the realty company turned over to the newly formed ompany five lots at Bayocean, a lighting plant and an electric fran-chise, in full payment for its stock. The complainants allege that the volue of the property so delivered to the natatorium corporation actually did not exceed \$5,000. They ask judg-They ask nent for the difference, or \$70,599.
