FISHERMEN AT NEHALEM HAVE TROUBLE.

Union Fishermen's Co-Operation Compy Brings Restraining Suit.

Union Fishermen's Co-operative Company vs. F. Bolle, Albert Crawford, Wm. Crawford, C. H. Christensen, Joe Duncan, F. C. Emery, Dave Gervais, William Hartzell, C. L. Hoag, Chas. Joelsing, Rudolph Larsen, Louis Ludtke, H. H. Myers, Ralph Robison, Chas. Stephens, H. Schollmeyer, Sam Thompson, W. R. Walker, Fred Witte, O. L. Wood, Miller, W. F. Balmer, A. D. Thompson, Edgar Bartzner, F. A. Emery, A. Klein, Oscar Bergman, Chas. Seamon, John Seamon, Harry Green, Jacob Kamm, M. F. Bowman, Paul Walker, Elmer Eason, Arthur Loerpabel, J. Lommen, Ralph McKimens, L. G. Wilton, —and Bowen, Hankela and Kynsi and H. W. Tubbsing is a complaint filed in the circuit court for a temporary restraining order pending the trial of the suit.

It is alleged in the complaint that on or about the 15th of September, 1917, defendants maliciously conspired, combined, confederated and agreed together and amongst themselves to ruin plaintiff's business of operating two drag-seines by wrongfully, unlawfully and maliciously obstructing the current and flow of the waters of Nehalem river over and above and in front of and abutting the tide lands in front of plaintiff's property by threatening to place and by actually placing set gill nets and by threatening to place drift gill nets in the waters flowing over and across the tideland in front thereof and in close proximity thereto, well knowing that salmon fish will not enter or catch itself in such fishing devices during the day time, and not with the bona fide intention of catching salmon, and for that and other reasons the plaintiff company prays the court to enjoin and restrain the defendants from further unlawfully obstructing the waters of the Nehalem river abutting on plaintiff's property, and asks damages in the sum of \$5,000.00.

The case came up this (Thursday) morning, when the attorneys in the case presented the case, it has been set for trial on Monday morning. There was a large number of fishermen from Nehalem in court.

AGRICULTURE NOTES.

Does Tillamook Wish Another Big Industry?

Mention has been previously made regarding the possibilities of berries and small fruits on our less productive soils. Opportunity now knocks at our doors for a chance to come into the county with a loganberry juice plant and make possible the development of this class of land. Last week at Salem several of the Tillamook people took the opportunity to visit the Pheasant Juice Co.'s plant to see what kind of an outfit they have. All had good reports to make.

They wish to establish a plant in Tillamook, and, I believe, will by so doing open up great possibilities for those who own the hill and prairie lands. In order that all may have a chance to consider this proposition a series of meetings has been called as follows:

Monday, Oct. 8th, at 2 p.m. at Wheeler.

Monday, Oct. 8th, at 7:30 p.m., Bay City at Gymnasium.

Tuesday, Oct. 9th, at 1:30 p.m. at Tillamook at Court House.

Wednesday, Oct. 10th, at 1:30 p.m. Beaver.

Representatives from the Pheasant Fruit Juice Co. will be present and explain their proposition to us. Any questions regarding loganberry culture and possibilities will be cheerfully answered.

They have promised to bring along several cases of Phez to that all may be treated with some of the product.

The sales of loganberry products from this state will this year amount to about \$2,000,000. The market is growing. 10,000 additional acres are needed immediately to keep up with the demand. How much can Tillamook county furnish?

Be sure to attend one of these meetings next week and see what can be done.

The County Court at its meeting yesterday found it necessary to condemn the North Fork bridge at Nehalem, as it was found that the bridge was rotten and liable to collapse at any moment. The bridge was built eleven years since. It will be several weeks before travel will be allowed by that route for vehicles, but foot passengers can take their chances of crossing the bridge.

SUIT TO TEST LEGALITY OF COUNTY ROAD BONDS

Brought in the Circuit Court to Restraining County Court from Selling Bonds.

A friendly suit was filed on Tuesday by Smith W. Elliott against the County Court of Tillamook County in the circuit court which is to test the legality of the measure passed by the people when they voted in favor of \$412,000 for county road bonds. Attorney H. T. Botts is the attorney in the case.

The County Court undertook to sell bonds and a number of bids were received, after which they were all withdrawn, the bond buyers claiming that there were some irregularities in the election.

The complaint is a lengthy document giving the entire proceedings which led up to and after the election. The plaintiff prays that the defendants be forever restrained from issuing, selling or in any manner disposing of or attempting to dispose of any bonds or warrants or any other evidences of indebtedness whatsoever, based or claimed to be based upon the authority of the petition filed in May 4, 1917, and of the election held in pursuance thereof and of the subsequent orders made in regard thereto by the county court. That it be decreed that said petition was insufficient to authorize any election to be held upon the matters therein contained, and that the election held in pursuance thereof on the 4th day of June, 1917, be decreed to be void and of no effect, and that the said election and election be and decreed to be null and void and of no effect; that it be then decreed by this court that the defendant county and individual defendants, as members of the county court and their successors in office, be forever restrained and enjoined from selling or issuing the bonds purporting to be authorized by said petition and election to the said Keeler Bros. on the bid and offer set out in the complaint, or upon any other bid or offer for any less sum or amount than the par value of said bonds as required by law, and that they be enjoined and restrained from accepting any less price, either directly or by any subterfuge or evasion or by any allowance to the purchase of said bonds or any other security which might be lawfully issued in place thereof, of any sum or sums whatsoever for expenses in connection therewith other than the reasonable value of such expenses, and that the plaintiff have such other and further relief as to the court may seem equitable.

Circuit Court in Session.

The October term of the Circuit Court convened on Monday with Judge Geo. R. Bagley presiding.

A grand jury was drawn composed of J. S. Diehl, L. J. Earl, Frank Paul, Frank Krumm, E. W. Knight, R. B. McClay and W. Tubbsing. The judge appointed Mr. Knight the foreman of the jury.

C. C. Byers was indicted by the grand jury, who was charged with embezzlement of school funds of Rockaway district. When arraigned, Byers pleaded guilty, and the judge sentenced him to the penitentiary from one to fifteen years but paroled him on condition that he is to refund the district the money he defrauded it of within 12 months, to pay the county the expense of the prosecution and not to leave the state. Byers' shortage amounted to \$1,641.33, and for nearly four years he used a slick method of defrauding the school district and falsifying the school reports. It was by comparing the reports sent to the county school superintendent and the reports of the district kept by the school districts that the discrepancies were discovered.

In the two fish cases, in which Mrs. Lulu Fleck and Gene Garrett were found guilty in Justice Taylor's court for violating the fish laws, and were each fined \$50.00, these cases were appealed to the circuit court. On Tuesday the case against Mrs. Fleck was tried before a jury, which brought in a verdict of not guilty. It is reported that when the jury took the first ballot 11 jurors went on amount that Mrs. Fleck was guilty and one not guilty, and somehow the one jurymen managed to convince the other 11 jurors that Mrs. Fleck was not guilty. The judge dismissed the case against Garrett.

Frank La Flamby was indicted for violating the prohibition law, and he pleaded guilty. The judge fined him the maximum penalty of \$500.00. It was bitter that he had been selling, and as he had been told by the manufacturers that he could sell it and not violate the prohibition law, the judge reduced the fine to \$25.00 upon the payment of same and of good behavior.

The canning team consisting of Marie and Pauline Geinger and Gladys Klinehan, from Dist. No. 57 sent to Salem by the County Fair Board did splendidly. They won 4th place which was excellent, as this was their first effort and the competition was very keen among the ten counties taking part in the canning contest.

We also understand that Dillow Smith, of Dist. No. 10 took second in dairy herd record keeping, and Noah Richards, of Beaver, took second in potato raising.

The county superintendent and teachers are already planning for next year's club work, and the school exhibit at the county fair will be far better than this year. Encouraged by the showing made at the state fair this year, it is planned to have a big school exhibit at Salem next year. Our schools should capture first place with a booth there in 1918.

PROOF FROM FOREST GROVE

Forest Grove Citizens Speak out Publicly.
