Another effort is being made to raise \$3,000,000 Liberty Bonds, and the government is now making an appeal to the people of the United States to respond for financial help in the great crisis. Especially is the government appealing to the farmers, for they did not participate in the first issue as those living in the cities. The snap shot man is now going to appeal to the dairymen of Tillamook County to do their bit and come forward and subscribe for the bonds. They are able to do so financially, and should do so cheerfully, in fact, are better fixed financially than farmers in other parts of the state. As we live in peace, prosperity and happiness in Tillamook County, what a marked contrast to the slaughter, bloodshed, devastation and frightfulness that have been going on in Belgium, France, Russia and the other countries at war, all brought about by a blood-thirsty monarch like the Kaiser and his war lords. Tillamook County's young men have readily responded to the country's call for men, and now the government appeals to the people, especially the farmers, to take up these Liberty Bonds, the money to be used to help prosecute the war and rid the world of Germany's war lords and militarism. As a result of the war the dairymen are receiving war prices for their cheese and, surely, they should respond liberally to the new Liberty Loan. But there are others of our citizens who are well able to take up more bonds, and, no doubt, they will do so. Liberty Bonds are good investments and good collateral. Every dairyman in our county should buy a Liberty Bond, and now is the proper time to do so, by going to either the Tillamook County Bank or the First National Bank in this city, or the banks at Cloverdale, Bay City and Wheeler, and they will furnish the proper blanks. Tillamook county should take up to the seriousness of the awful conflict that is now going on and help stop it, and this can be done by buying a Liberty Bond.

There was a public meeting at the City Hall on Wednesday evening, but the attendance was not as large as it might have been, for the hall should have been packed to its limits. The body of the hall, however, was well filled, and those present took a lively interest in the meeting. It was called by order by Thad Robison, of the Tillamook County Bank, the speakers of the evening were Oscar Furuset, of Portland; Walter Dimick, of Oregon City, and Mayor R. T. Boals. Mr. Furuset took up the bond question and fully explained every detail, while Mr. Dimick reviewed the history of the war, the cause and the reality of conducting the war by the Kaiser and his war lords. He made a strong appeal to the audience to do their bit and help the government. Mayor Boals thought the Kaiser was crazy.

As a result of the meeting over 7,000 worth of Liberty Bonds were sold, bringing the amount up to \$2,450,000.

William Maxwell, the Fairview dairyman, was the biggest individual bond buyer at the meeting, who, with good patriotic smile, took \$800.00 worth of bonds.

The citizens are asked to come forward at once and purchase more of these Liberty Bonds. It is a patriotic duty we owe to our country. \$25,000 more is needed. Won't you help?

Change in Postage Rates.

The plaintiff alleges that defendant took her to a rooming house in Portland, where he left her for two or three days with nothing to eat, and without money to procure food, and she became dependent upon the landlady of the rooming house to escape starvation. About the middle of last February defendant abandoned plaintiff.

The new cheese factory for the Holstein Dairymen's Association, Factory No. 1 is now under construction. The building will be 40 by 90 feet and boiler room 20 by 40 feet. The material used for the building will be hollow brick tile laid in black mortar, it having concrete floor and foundation and the petitions will be built with tile plastered on the interior with white enamel plaster. The capacity of the factory will be 30,000 pounds of milk per day, and equipped with the latest approved machinery for making Tillamook County's famous cheese and will cost in the neighborhood of \$8,000.

The Supreme Court at the request of Attorneys T. H. Goyne and H. T. Botts, advanced the county road bond measure case that was argued before Judge G. R. Bagley last week, who held that the law was properly enacted, but restrained the county court from selling bonds with commission charges added. The case will come up in the Supreme Court for argument today (Thursday) when Attorney H. T. Botts will appear for the plaintiff and District Attorney Goyne and Senator Fulton for the defendants. This, however, is a friendly suit, brought to decide two points--the legality of the election and selling bonds for more than 5 per cent interest. The law specifies the maximum amount of interest which is 5 per cent.

Death of James Hughey.

James Hughey, who has been a settler of Tillamook county since 1874, passed away on Tuesday evening at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Sarah Rush, on the Wilson River. The funeral services are to be held today (Thursday) and the enternment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

James Hughey was born in King County, Canada, May 1, 1844. His father, William Hughey, was born in Ireland, and after his marriage to a daughter of Erin came to America, locating in Canada, where he died when James was a mere boy. He received his elementary training in the north, and in 1865, when twenty-four years of age, went to New York City, and embarked for San Francisco, by way of Panama. Coming direct to Oregon, he located in McMinnville, where his first wife, Jane (Orr) Hughey, died leaving two small children, William and Sarah, now Mrs. Wesley Rush. Subsequently Mr. Hughey went to Panther creek in Moore's valley, and engaged in sawmilling, his partners being Messrs. Jones and Adams. In 1874, with the profits of the sawmilling business he purchased a farm of one hundred and forty-six acres in Tillamook County and engaged in the dairy business. In 1889 Mr. Hughey married his second wife, Myra Smith, a daughter of Miram Smith, who was the first white woman to settle along the Nestucca river. She died some few years ago.

13 COUNTY CLERKS FAIL TO OBEY LAW.

Neglect to File Statement Required and are Subject to Removal.

Salem, Or., Oct. 13--Because they have failed to comply with the law passed by the 1917 legislature imposing upon them the duty of filing certain data with the secretary of state, no less than 13 Oregon county clerks are subject to removal from office by the governor. The counties in which the clerks are delinquent are: Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Crook, Curry, Deschutes, Harney, Jackson, Jefferson, Morrow, Tillamook, Umatilla and Wheeler.

The law demands that within 10 days after October 1, beginning this year, and every quarter thereafter the clerks must file the following statistics among other items:

Number of law actions filed in the circuit court, equity suits filed aside from divorces, divorce suits, number of criminal cases, civil cases tried by jury, criminal cases tried by jury, contested law actions tried by court without jury, a statement relative to proceedings in the probate court, cost of maintaining juries in circuit court and for general jury work, cost of witnesses, cost of juries and bailiffs in the county court.

When shown the above news item County Clerk Harrison said he had been endeavoring the past week to prepare the report, but the attorneys here were up in the air and could not give him much advice about the law.
