Lee McCracken vs. Bay City Land Co., is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$1,355.88. The complaint alleges that plaintiff entered into a contract and agreement with the defendant to purchase certain lots, at the price of \$1,200.00, payable \$60 in cash and \$24.00 per month until the entire purchase price was paid with interest. Plaintiff claims he has performed his part of the contract, but when a deed was demanded on the 12th of September, 1917, he was told he could not obtain one until the 30th of November, 1917 as the company was unable to secure a release from a trust deed covering said premises.

Plaintiff also alleges that the company fraudulently concealed the fact that the premises were covered by mortgage or trust deed. When these facts were known to plaintiff, and the defendant had failed and neglected to clear the lots and to grade the streets in front of and adjacent thereto and to lay water mains along said street the plaintiff notified the defendant in writing that he would elect to rescind the contract and receive back the payments with interest, tendering the defendant a quit claim deed, which was refused. The plaintiff has paid the defendant \$1355.88 in installments.

Cheese Comes Down 3c.

Special meeting of directors of Tillamook County Creamery Ass'n. was held at Tillamook Wednesday, when were present George Williams, James Williams, Jay Baker, Rudolf Zweifel, Wm. Maxwell and Martin J. Jenck, six of the seven directors. Matters of general interest were taken up. It was shown that there were 84,328,964 lb. of American cheese held in storage reporting to the government, as against 49,579,142 lbs. reported in storage by storages reporting to the government.

There were 104 million lbs. butter in storage, as against 100 million lbs. last year. This shows that there is nearly as much cheese in storage as butter. The English government has established a maximum price of 21 1/4 cents on Canadian cheese and 21 1/2 cents on American cheese, f. o. b. seaboard. This precludes producers in this country exporting any cheese at any where near present prices. With holdings in this country about 60 per cent higher than last year at this time, it would seem that prices would have to come down to an export basis or else come low enough so cheese can be consumed here.

It was decided to sell Tillamook cheese at 22c. Wisconsin cheese is 22c, and can be laid down in Los Angeles at about the same price. Tillamook can be laid down there at a basis of 23c here.

The association factories produced 3,917,632 lbs. of cheese from January

1st to October 1st this year. This sold for \$918,145.00, an average of 23.4c. Tillamook Whey cream sold for \$9,352.00 during the same time.

While the cut of 3c. may seem a good deal at this time, it was thought best to make one cut than to keep coming down each week, as dealers would not take hold of cheese at any more money.

Y. M. C. A. TO HAVE DRIVE.

Needs \$35,000.00 to Carry on the Work—Tillamook County's Quota is \$2,000.

The Y. M. C. A. is to have its second drive, this time to raise \$35,000.00 to carry on the work in foreign countries as well as in the United States. A number of citizens met on Tuesday evening for the purpose of forming a county committee and to raise \$2,000.00, which is Tillamook County's quota.

Previous to the organization a number of informal talks were made by Attorney H. T. Botts, R. W. Kirk, Roy Jones and C. J. Edwards, as to what took place at a meeting in Portland last week, when they heard addresses from persons from different countries and those who are engaged in Y. M. C. A. work.

The officers of the county committee were then elected, as follows: C. J. Edwards, chairman county committee.

Roy Jones, county manager.
R. W. Kirk, chairman speakers committee.

C. C. Curtis, chairman publicity committee.
H. T. Botts, secretary.

These gentlemen will form the county executive committee and have charge of the Y. M. C. A. second drive. It is the intention to form other committees in other parts of the county, as well as to induce the different Granges to take an active part in raising the money.

The Y. M. C. A. next drive is scheduled from November 11 to November 18.

District Attorney Goyno Makes a Boozie Drive.

There is no doubt whatever that a conspiracy exists, in this city, in which several persons are implicated, by shipping liquor into Tillamook county. They have not only violated the prohibition law of the State of Oregon, but have violated federal laws as well, and for that reason they should be rounded up as quickly as possible.

District Attorney Goyno got a "hunch" the first part of the week and made a drive on the outhouses and wood shed of the Allen house, with the deputy sheriffs, and captured one full case of whisky containing 30 quart bottles and one empty case.

It seems that three boxes, Underwood type writer boxes, were consigned to the Lamar Drug Co., and marked toilet articles. On Saturday about five o'clock, a man went to the depot at a time when the freight agent was busy, with the proper papers. The agent thought the man was an employee of the Tillamook Transfer Co., allowed him to take the boxes the man signing Tillamook Transfer Co.

Mr. Lamar denies having anything to do with the shipment of whisky, the conspirators using the name of his drug store, as a blind. When interrogated the freight agent did not know who the man was, but remembered that he was a short thick set man.

The brand of whisky is Old Sage, claimed to be by those who know a poor grade of whisky. The sheriff's office is keeping close tab on th

case of whisky, keeping the bottles well corked for fear of poisoned gases and it is impossible even to get a taste or a little drop for an eye opener in the morning.
