

TILLAMOOK IN THE LIBERTY BOND DRIVE. County Made a Spenid Showing, the Patriotic Citizens Subscribing \$153,200.

The Liberty Loan drive in Tillamook County proved highly successful as well as gratifying to those who took part in the drive. It was a little surprising how the citizens came forward the last few days of the drive and this brought the amount up much higher than was expected. When the drive was first made it was generally understood that \$30,000 was the amount to be raised in the county, and it looked at one time that this was about as much as would be subscribed. Then the quota was raised to \$80,000 for the city and \$99,000 for the county. "You can't raise that amount of money," was the prediction, and it looked for several days that that was beyond our limit. But it wasn't. The Liberty Bond boosters put more ginger into the drive and with the Headlight's appeal to the people in our last issue, the money flowed in with remarkable speed, so much so the banks were kept busy, and when the drive closed on Saturday evening, everybody who had anything to do with the drive felt happy and perfectly satisfied with the flattering results, the last big bunch of subscribers coming from the logging camp on the south side of the bay, W. J. Riechers who went down there in the evening returning with a bunch of \$50 bills and checks to the amount of \$5,100.00. There were quite a number of persons who phoned in from the country districts on Saturday evening who wanted to buy bonds but as they were not in the city to sign the application blanks, they were disappointed at not being able to participate in the drive. This was their own fault, for they had been given plenty of time to come over the top.

The student body of the high school showed a fine spirit in the sale of Liberty Bonds. The school board gave them a half holiday and the students turned out en masse under their committee canvassing the entire town. They sold bonds to the amount of \$6,250. Bonds are owned by the students to the amount of \$800.00. Thad Robison, of the Tillamook County Bank, was in Portland on Monday, and he informs us that the Liberty Bond Committee in Portland was well pleased with what Tillamook County had done in the Liberty Bond drive.

POSTAGE RULES OUT. Friday Increased rates Go Into Effect.

Three cent letter postage goes into effect Friday of this week, as an additional measure to increase the revenues of the United States during the war period. Postal cards double in price. The postage on letters will be at the rate of 3 cents for every ounce or fraction thereof, excepting drop letters mailed for delivery from the office at which they are posted, which may be mailed at the rate of 2 cents per ounce or fraction. Postal cards are required to be prepaid 2 cents, and therefore 1-cent postal cards must have a 1-cent stamp affixed to them in addition to the 1-cent stamp impressed on such cards. Private mailing cards with written messages sent openly in the mails will be transmitted at the rate of 2 cents each, payable by stamps to be affixed by the sender. If less than 2 cents is prepaid on a letter or other first class matter it will be returned to the sender, if known, for the deficient postage. If the sender is not known, it will, if prepaid deficient postage and sent to
