State Tax Commissioner Galloway completed figures for all except four counties, showing the ratio of the assessed valuation as fixed by county Assessors to the actual cash value of the property assessed. These ratios are used in equalizing the state taxes and also in assessing the properties of public service corporations, which are assessed by the State Tax Commission. Tillamook County has the highest ratio, at 93 per cent, and Lincoln is second, at 88 per cent. Multnomah County's ratio is 60 per cent.

New Power Boat for Garibaldi

Hon Fred C. Baker, Tillamook, Ore.
My dear Mr. Baker:—In the absence of Congressman W. C. Hawley, who is in Tillamook County today, I beg to give below a copy of a letter he has just received.
Headquarters U. S. Coast Guard.
Washington, Oct. 30, 1917.
Hon W. C. Hawley, M. C.,
Salem Oregon.

My dear Mr. Hawley:
I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 23rd, ult., urging that a new power lifeboat be placed at Station No. 312 (Tillamook Bay) to take the place of the old one at that station.

It is proposed to replace the old boat at Station No. 312 with another suitable boat at the earliest opportunity. The funds available for this char-

acter of equipment, from the limited appropriations made by Congress, are taxed to the utmost and are by no means sufficient to meet the pressing demands coming from all over the service. Many of the boats at the older stations in the service are becoming unsuitable by reason of age and hard usage and must, of necessity, immediately be replaced by new ones. This condition makes it imperative for this office to exercise the closest discrimination in the distribution of the limited number of boats which the funds will permit us to build, and also I regret to say, renders it necessary, for the time being, to defer supplying those which, according to our best information are not absolutely indispensable.

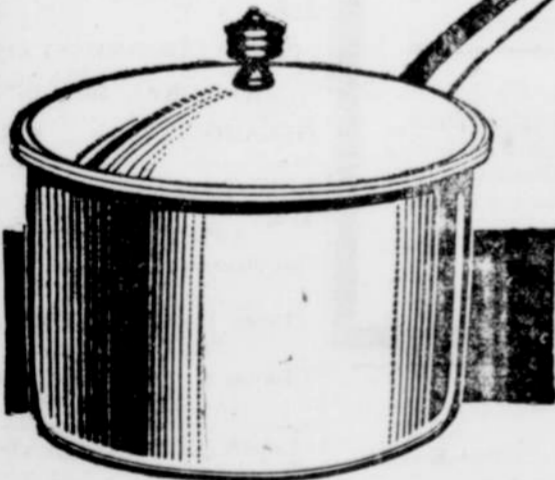

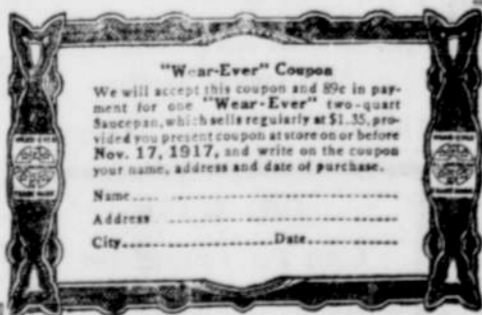
