SPECIAL ROAD TAX WANTED IN ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1

To Improve the Road from Brighton And Build Bridge from Wheeler to Nehalem.

Taxpayers in the north part of the County have petitioned the County Court to call a meeting for the purpose of voting a special tax of five mills to improve the road from Brighton and build a bridge from Wheeler to Nehalem, and the County Court approved the petition and ordered a meeting to be held at Nehalem on Friday, November 30, at 9 a.m.

The amount of money that a 5 mill tax will raise in road district No. 1 will be \$32,745, and at the special meeting only freeholders are allowed to vote, as will be seen by the law quoted below.

The Petition.

The undersigned freeholders residing in road district No. 1, of Tillamook County, State of Oregon, respectfully petition and request that you call a district road meeting of the legal voters of said road district No. 1, for the purpose of voting an additional tax of 5 mills on the dollar on all taxable property of said road district to be extended upon the tax roll of Tillamook County, Oregon for the year 1917.

This was approved by the County Court and an election was ordered to be held on Friday, the 30th day of November, 1917, at the hour of 9 a.m. at the Woodmen of the World Hall in Upper Nehalem.

Where Money is to be Expended.

Following is an agreement that the County Court have entered into: "A petition has been filed with the County Court for your district, requesting that a road district meeting be called for the purpose of voting a five mill special road tax, and the court has approved the petition and ordered the meeting held.

"It is our understanding that it is the desire of the people of that vicinity who wish to have the meeting called, that the funds raised by the special tax should be used in improving the county road between Brighton, through Wheeler to Nehalem, including the building of a bridge over the Nehalem river. The improvement to begin at Brighton. And it is the intention of the court to use the funds for that purpose if the special tax is voted.

"The court has approved of the matter for the reason that the county bond issue which has been held invalid by the supreme court, providing for the improvement of this part of the road and set apart funds for that purpose and we understand from this that the people of that locality desire the improvement made. The usual road fund will not be sufficient in amount to take care of this and for that reason it will be necessary to have the special tax if the improvement is to be made."

We give below the law governing a special road district meeting.

Established Road Districts.

The county courts of the several states shall, as often as they may deem necessary, but no oftener than once a year, divide their respective counties or any part thereof into suitable and convenient road districts, each of which shall be numbered, and cause a brief description of the same to be entered upon the county records. Each county court at the September term thereof, shall so arrange the road districts of the county as to conform to the provisions of this section, and at the September term of said court every year thereafter and at no other time make such changes in the road districts of the county as may be deemed necessary; provided, that all road districts found under the provisions of this act shall be formed from contiguous territory; provided further, that every incorporate city and town shall constitute a separate road district, and the county court shall not have authority to divide such territory or include any of it in any other road district.

Petition for Improvement.

Upon a petition of twelve or a majority of the resident freeholders of any road district, approved by the road master, praying for a change in grade or other extensive improvements, the county court shall instruct the county surveyor, engineer or roadmaster, to proceed as soon as convenient to the place named in the petition and make such investigations, surveys or estimates, as the court may require and report the same in writing to the county court, setting forth all material matters necessary to fully advise the county court; and if the county court shall determine in favor of such improvement they shall grant the petition of such freeholders, and proceed to make such change in grade or improvements.

Road District Meetings.

Whenever three freeholders of any road district in this state shall petition the county court of the county wherein such road district is located to call a district road meeting of the legal voters of the district, and shall state in such petition the object for which the meeting is desired, the county court shall fix a time and place for holding such meeting and cause notice thereof to be posted, published, or given as in this act provided.

All district road meetings shall be conducted in a decent and orderly manner, and shall be governed by the rules of order known as "Robert's Rules of Order."

The meeting shall proceed to elect a chairman and a competent secretary from among their own members who

UP TO BENSON TO DECIDE

Yamhill-Nestucca Highway Route in Tillamook County.

County Court of Tillamook County, Tillamook, Oregon.

Gentlemen:—At the last regular meeting of the State Highway Commission, a delegation appeared before them requesting that they take final action on the location of the disputed portion of the Yamhill-Nestucca Highway, and the Commission accordingly notified the delegation that the matter had been placed in Mr. Benson's hands for decision, but they were willing to hear any arguments at any time that those interested wish to present them.

The Commission will hold a meeting in Mr. Benson's office, 1301 Yeon Building, Portland, on Tuesday, November 27th, and will be glad to meet all those interested in this matter at that time. Mr. Benson has requested all delegations which appear before the commission to confine themselves to facts and figures which may be useful to the Commission in making their decision from the standpoint of a state proposition, and he wishes all delegations to keep out of their arguments local matters and local controversies bearing on the location of the highway. His method of arriving at the proper location of a highway is from the viewpoint of the advantage to the people of the State of Oregon as a whole rather than from the local community standpoint. I mention this for your information in the preparation of your argument.

shall be resident taxpayers of such road district; it shall be the duty of such chairman to preside over the deliberations of such meetings and sign the minutes thereof as prepared by the secretary, after the same have been submitted to and approved by him. The secretary shall keep the minutes of the meeting, submit the same to the chairman of the meeting for his approval or correction, and after being so approved and signed by the chairman and secretary, shall certify and transmit the same to the clerk of the county court who shall preserve them on file with the other records of such road district.

Who May Vote at District Meetings; Rules Governing.

Any citizen of this state, male or female, who is twenty-one years of age, and has been a bona fide resident of the district for thirty days immediately preceding the meeting or election, and the title of which is in her or his own name, on which he or she is liable or subject to pay tax, shall be entitled to vote at any district road meeting. In all other regards the laws of this state governing school district meetings shall control at all road district meetings.

Road District; Special Tax.

The resident taxpayers of any road district in any county of the state may vote an additional tax not to exceed ten mills on the dollar on all taxable property of the road district, if the county court shall first approve such additional tax by indorsement to that effect upon the petition for a road district meeting to be held for that purpose.

Meetings for the purpose of voting additional taxes in road districts shall be held in the month of November.

If a majority of the resident taxpayers present and voting at such meeting shall favor such tax, the chairman and secretary of such meeting shall cause to be filed with the county clerk prior to the first day of December following, the certified minutes of such meeting, and the county clerk shall furnish a certified copy thereof to the county assessor, who shall thereupon compute and extend the levy therefor on the assessment roll for that year, the same as other taxes are intended, and it shall be the duty of the tax collector to collect such taxes in money, and turn the same over to the county treasurer in the same manner as other taxes are collected and turned over, and they shall be credited and kept by the treasurer to the account of such road district and expended under the supervision of the county court upon roads within the district voting such tax.

Notice of Road District Meeting.

Notices of any meeting of the legal voters of any road district shall be prepared by the county court, signed by the county judge or a county commissioner, set forth the purposes of such meeting, and the time and place, when and where it is to be held.

The county court shall cause such notices to be posted by the county roadmaster, a deputy roadmaster, patrolman or other competent person, at least ten days before the time stated therein for holding such meeting, in three conspicuous places within such road district, and in the customary place for posting notices at such road district lies, and if such notices are for a meeting called for the purpose of voting a special tax, by also causing the same to be published once each week for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation throughout said county.

Proof of posting of any such notices shall be made by affidavit of the person posting them, indorsed upon or attached to a certified copy of the notices posted, and filed with the county clerk.

Proof of publication of such notices shall be made in the same form and manner as proof of the publication of other legal notices are required by law to be made.
