ROAD BUILDERS WANTED

Experienced Highway Construction Men, For Service in France.

Men who have had experience in any branch of road construction are offered an opportunity to see early service in France in special road-building battalions of the U. S. Army by recruiting plans here announced. These battalions will be required to repair and maintain the highways near the fighting front, over which tremendous traffic is operated continually. They will also build new strategic highways in the war zone.

The organizations of the battalions is as nearly the same as that of large contracting forces as is feasible. Modern road building machinery has been fully provided, including rock-crushing plants, steam shovels, road rollers, tractors, graders, motor trucks and pumps. A full line of dump wagons, wheel and drag scrapers and similar dirt-moving equipment also will be available.

Who Can Qualify.

For the non-commissioned officer positions men are required who can qualify in private life in the following lines: Superintendents and assistant superintendents of highway, bridge and quarry work, of mechanical plant and transportation; chief clerks, material men, stock men, timekeepers, foremen for concrete, road, bridge and quarry work; powder men, riggers, carpenters, iron workers, surveyors and draftsmen.

For the enlisted personnel it is desired to secure men skilled and experienced in one or more of the following occupations: surveyors, draftsmen, clerks, stenographers, axmen, blacksmiths, blacksmiths' helpers, machinists, gas-engine operators, and repairers, crusher operators, hand drillers, drill runner (air drill), quartermen, powdermen, masons, teamsters, pile-driver operators, concrete, form, road and bridge men, tractor operators, (gasoline), grader operators, (blading and elevating graders), bridge carpenters, motor truck drivers, chauffeurs, cooks, motor truck and automobile repair men, pipe fitters, electricians, horseshoers, tailors, shoemakers, musicians (bugle, fife or drum), mechanics, telephone operators, steamfitters, tool sharpeners, ditchers, boatmen (builders and caulkers), shovel runners (gasoline), barbers, veterinarians, French interpreters, bituminous road men, iron workers, riggers, general utility men capable of driving automobiles, motor trucks and all types of gasoline driven machinery.

Any male American citizen between 18 and 40 years of age, and who has not actually been called by a local board in the draft, is eligible for enlistment in these special battalions, if acceptable physically. All men must first enlist as privates, the rate of pay being \$33 per month and expenses. Men with the necessary experience may be assigned to special duties and given non-commissioned rank at rates of pay ranging from \$40.20 to \$66.00 per month and expenses. The latter include, for both privates and non-commissioned officers, food, clothing, medical attendance and transportation. Those who enlist will be eligible immediately for promotion, according to their ability and as openings occur. Men who are specially well qualified and recommended will be given definite promise of advancement to higher grades when their enlistment is authorized.

NEW DRAFT RULES READY FOR ISSUE.

Regulations to Be Mailed Local Exemption Boards of Country Next Week.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Copies of the new army draft regulations came off the press today for a final reading preparatory to mailing to the local exemption boards throughout the country next week.

Under the new plan the burden of supplying information which will result in his being placed in his proper classification under the selective service law rests squarely upon the individual registrant. All instructions now in the hands of the boards will be annulled upon the receipt of the new regulations, which are greatly reduced in extent and simplified in process.

Information is Complete.

Included in the new book is everything bearing on the draft processes as now organized, from the time the questionnaire is to be sent to each registrant and filled out and returned to the boards, until accepted men are actually in the military service. Each book carries a copy of the statutes and also a verified copy of the master list of the drawing.

The questionnaire is the basis of the plan of grouping registrants in five classes, liable for duty by classes. The boards will be able to classify a man immediately when his questionnaire has been received.

Work of Boards Lessened.

The questionnaire process will eliminate from consideration for military service probably 95 per cent of the men who would have been discharged or exempted under the old plan. Under the first call the average board was compelled to examine five men to obtain one for service. In some cases not more than one out of 10 or 12 was sent to the camps.

It is expected that, under the new scheme, the average figure will be reversed and at most not more than one man in five called will fail to pass his physical examination and be rejected.

ROADS TO BE BUILT.

Construction Will go on Despite War Says S. Benson.

That no necessity exists for the abandonment of road work now being carried on and that several sufficient reasons exist why it should be continued, is the reply of S. Benson, Chairman of the State Highway Commission, to the appeal of a lumbermen's committee praying that the road work be modified during the war and that labor be released for lumbering operations.

Resolutions to such effect recently were drawn by the committee of lumbermen and submitted to the Governor and the State Highway Commission, declaring that "the proposed plans for a road building campaign in Oregon be modified so as to offer as little competition as possible to the lumber industry, which is severely handicapped by lack of the necessary labor to supply the most urgent demands of the government."

Mr. Benson Gives Views.

In discussing the request, Mr. Benson said:

"I have talked with many lumbermen since the resolution was presented and find that it is not in keeping with the general sentiment which favors continuance of road work. The men who drafted the resolution are not unknown to me. They have always been opposed to highway construction."

"I assert that the labor used in building roads is not the labor of the logging camps. For the most part it is recruited from farmers of the localities through which the work runs, who are looking for temporary jobs between farm seasons."

"Highway construction is not being pushed extensively at present. The state is doing only such work as serves to connect up existing highways that are of prime importance for military or economic purposes."

Labor Surplus Foreseen.

"The commission discussed the resolution last Tuesday. We came to the conclusion that we are not interfering with the production of food, lumber, or anything that is essential to the prosecution of the war."

"Another thing to be considered is that there will be a large surplus of labor during the winter, which cannot be used for anything else save road work. It is important that some road work should be going on to take care of this surplus. There is quite a large proportion of labor, as well, that is skilled in paving, rockwork and road construction, that will not work at anything else."

"Road work will not be abandoned. There is no reason why it should be and a half a dozen very good reasons why it should be continued."
