Work on the five miles of hard surfaced road being put down by the State Highway Commission, with the assistance of county funds, is postponed until next spring, owing to a break down in the machinery. As soon as weather will permit in the spring work will be resumed and completed as soon as possible, for all the material is on the ground. Deputy State Engineer Dunn is surveying the other 15 miles of road, being now beyond Beaver, and it is the intention of the State Highway Commission to have this hard surfaced next year if the county is in a position to pay its share of the cost.

Death of Fred Zaddach.

Fred Zaddach, one of the best known and highly respected citizens of the north part of the county passed away on Wednesday evening. The news of his death was a surprise to a large number of the citizens, for it was not known that he had been sick by many. The cause of death was pneumonia, and for a week previous to the time of his death he had been unconscious.

The deceased is an old settler of Tillamook county, having taken up a homestead in 1887, and proved up on the same in 1887.

He married a daughter of George Dean who survives him with four children, viz: Mrs. Emery, Mrs. Agnes Stevens, and Gilbert and Fred Zaddach.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of a large number of friends and citizens, who deplore his death.

Tillamooker "Stung."

F. B. Rutherford, a Portland attorney, was arrested Thursday in Chicago on telegraphic advices from District Attorney Evans, of Portland, according to information received by Mr. Evans. A warrant in the hands of District Attorney charges Rutherford with defrauding E. W. Berger, of Tillamook County, out of \$400.

It is charged Rutherford persuaded Berger to mortgage his large farm for \$400 to provide funds with which Rutherford could buy an automobile to demonstrate a "gas saver" that he said he had invented. Berger was made a partner to the enterprise.

Rutherford, it is said, bought the auto according to schedule, but purchased it with a worthless check and kept Berger's \$400.

When Rutherford and the auto were missing from Portland District Attorney Evans sent broadcast for his arrest. An indictment was issued against him by the grand jury October 31. In Chicago authorities noticed that the Oregon license on the machine in which Rutherford was touring with

his bride corresponded with the number of the auto described in District Attorney Evans' circular, and arrested him.

F. B. Rutherford was graduated from the Oregon Law School in 1905, and has practiced law in Portland for several years.

Tillamookers Pleased With Old Mexico.

Miss Kathleen Mills, who was deputy county clerk for 13 years, tells of a very interesting trip which she and her brother, Morrison, made into Old Mexico. They spent about two weeks in the state of Sonora, where they went to look at the agricultural lands in the Sonora Valley. She had purchased 160 acres before making the trip and after seeing the wonderful possibilities of that country she increased her holdings to 320 acres and her brother, Morrison, also purchased a half section.

She visited an American rancher at Noria, who resides near the land she purchased and in his auto traveled extensively over the surrounding country, which gave her a good insight into the way the natives grow their crops and was surprised to see such wonderful growth with such crude implements and practically no cultivation. They then went down to Guaymas, where they met Wilber Stilwell, and enjoyed two days fishing in the Gulf of California on the gas schooner Frolic, formerly of Tillamook. They tell some wonderful fish stories that would be hard to believe if it were not for the photographs she brought to prove her stories. The first day's fishing with hook and line trolling they caught nine different varieties. Another remarkable feature of the trip which was contrary to all reports she had heard, was the quiet and peacefulness of the natives, and the gentle courtesy and friendliness in which they were received on their trip throughout the entire state.

At Guaymas they found good hotels run by Americans and many American guests, and had they not telegraphed ahead for reservations would have been unable to secure accommodations. Many Americans were turned away and had to seek rooms in the native hotels.

They were greatly pleased with the country and the land and intend returning in the near future.

RED CROSS ORGANIZATION

Mrs. C. J. Edwards Elected President and Mrs. A. C. Everson, Secretary

There was a large attendance of ladies and a small sprinkling of gentlemen at the city hall on Tuesday evening for the purpose of organizing a branch of the Portland Red Cross, when Mrs. C. J. Edwards acted as temporary chairman and Mrs. A. C. Everson secretary.

It was fully explained why there had been so much delay in getting started in Tillamook county and the secretary read letters and literature pertaining to starting an organization, when the names of those were called who signed the original petition, and those who had subscribed in the Red Cross drive and had signed the card with the understanding that they would be members of the local organization when formed, after which a number of others signed the roll to become members. That concluded the preliminary work of the meeting when the election of permanent officers was the next business.

Mrs. Edwards made an earnest plea that they would not elect her president, and Mrs. Gibson stated some good reasons why a gentleman should be elected president, but the meeting was of a contrary opinion, for it was overwhelmingly in favor of making Mrs. Edwards president. After being elected she made an earnest plea for united support and co-operation of the members. The officers elected were:

President—Mrs. C. J. Edwards.
Vice-President—Mrs. W. B. Alderman.
Secretary—Mrs. A. C. Everson.
Treasurer—Thad Robinson.
Member Executive Board—Fred C. Baker.

The membership of the new organization is now 174, which includes those who subscribed in the Red Cross drive and those who have since joined, which is a large number of members for a new organization.

The letter of most importance read to the meeting pertained to the Red Cross drive and the finances, which explains itself, and is as follows:

November 13, 1917.
Mrs. A. C. Everson, Tillamook, Ore.
My Dear Mrs. Everson:—I am in receipt of your letter of November 9 relative to the organization of your branch of the Portland Chapter of the American Red Cross, and your desire to be advised of the status of subscribers who signify their wish to become members.

Up to date Tillamook has actually paid into the State Treasurer \$3,806.05. Had you a branch at the time of this collection, there would have been no question but what your branch would be entitled to 25 per cent of this amount or \$974.01.

I believe that it is possible even now for me to obtain this amount of money for your branch as soon as papers have been finally issued and certain formalities have been gone through by this office.

If this can be done, it will give you the funds which I judge are urgently needed in your vicinity to carry on Red Cross work.

As far as memberships are concerned, Washington has notified me that each chapter or branch can retain 50 cents for every subscriber who elected to become a member of the Red Cross during the last campaign and that each chapter or branch might retain from the funds subscribed during the last campaign an amount up to 25 per cent of the total subscription, provided however that the sum total of these two amounts, namely 50c for each subscriber elected membership, and the percentage of the total subscription, cannot exceed 25 per cent of the amount subscribed.

In your case then, according to this ruling, you will either be entitled to \$974.01 which is 25 per cent of the amount actually received by me from your district—or, you may receive 50 cents for each one of your 128 subscribers desiring membership, to wit \$64.00, and \$910.01 to be returned from me.

My suggestion is that as soon as you have formed your chapter, you let me know. I will send you the necessary forms and applications to fill out and when I have received them back, I will send you a check for \$974.01 which will cover everything and you can then send on to Portland the names of your 128 subscribers desiring membership.

It is hoped that a large number of Red Cross workers and others will be present, for Mrs. Gillingham will give useful information in regard to Red Cross work. This meeting will also give others an opportunity to join the Tillamook Red Cross and be present at the meeting.

40 Red Cross Workers Get Busy.

The Red Cross is now organized and 40 women were in the new rooms on Wednesday afternoon. The building was donated for the society's use by C. I. Clough, who furnished the stove and fuel for heating. The building was formerly occupied by Mr. Clough on First Street where he conducted his drug business for many years. The Coast Power Co. will furnish free the electricity for lighting as the short days will necessitate. Four machines have been donated and yesterday the Singer Co. repaired one and sent over the fifth one. Will some other progressive business men do as much to help on the good cause? The women are making for the hospital service, tray cloths, napkins, handker-

chiefs, bed socks, ambulance pillows, for the camps, dish cloths, gun wipers, knitting the recommended articles. They are a busy lot when at the rooms. Ask the president Mrs. C. J. Edwards, or the secretary Mrs. A. C. Everson about the 9 patch blocks they call for, also other materials. The Treasurer of the Portland Chapter will arrive on Friday and will address all who care to come to the city hall at 7:30 p.m., answering all questions and giving plans. The meeting every Wednesday will appeal to all the loyal women. That means every woman who can attend. It is for the comfort of our young men still on our own soil and over-seas.

PREPARING FOR NEXT DRAFT

Men to be Placed in Classes—Attorneys to Act as Advisors in Answering Questions.

Every man registered for the draft will be sent a Questionnaire in the next two or three weeks that he must fill out and return in seven days to his local exemption board.

These Questionnaires are long and the answers to some of the questions may require considerable study. But though Uncle Sam will insist that all the questions be answered he is going to providing him with free legal assistance and advice in writing out his answers.

To this end the Government is about to mobilize all the lawyers of the country for patriotic service. The mobilization will be voluntary—but every lawyer will be expected to do his bit and volunteer.

State, county and district legal advisory boards are to be formed at once in Oregon, as in all other states, to take charge of this work within each district. The chairman of each county board will be, whenever practicable, the county judge or a judge of the circuit court.

These legal advisory boards will be held responsible for seeing that a competent force of lawyers, or qualified laymen, is at all times available for consultation by all registrants desiring their services, during the period when the Questionnaires are to be answered.

Not only that, but the legal advisory board will delegate these duties to lawyers in the smaller towns and villages, so that wherever a registered man may be, he will have available a competent legal advisor to help him make out his Questionnaire.

So far as the lawyers are concerned, it will all be a labor of patriotism on their part. Not a cent will they charge any registrant for their services.

"It should be the pride of every lawyer," says a statement by the War Department, "that no registrant without in his district is without competent legal advice and assistance in preparing all papers that such registrant is required to submit in the process of the selection of citizens of this Nation for duty in the present emergency."

The prompt filling out and return of Questionnaires to local exemption boards by registrants is of the greatest importance. On the information obtained through the Questionnaires will be based the new system of classification on which selection of men for military service under the draft hereafter will be made.

Boys' and Girls' Aid Society.

The annual Thanksgiving appeal made by the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Oregon to the school children and citizens of the state has always met met with enthusiastic response from teachers, pupils and friends throughout Oregon. It is to be hoped that a similar appeal for food supplies and money will not go unheeded in spite of the many duties and economies which the war incurs.

The society is practicing every legitimate economy, but with its receiving home full to capacity, to say nothing of a waiting list, and with the price of milk three times what it was last spring, with a constantly decreasing income, The Boys' and Girls' Aid Society cannot function to the best of its ability without the support of its friends in the schools and of the public in general.

The Society is asking for \$15,000 as well as donations of canned fruit and vegetables. Such supplies will be shipped free of charge by the railroad companies to the organization until December 31st.

County Court Proceedings

In the matter of the vacation of Garibaldi beach and the relating same to Garibaldi Cove it was ordered that plat as heretofore filed be vacated and property replatted under and by the name of Garibaldi Cove.

In the matter of the petition of Geo. Loerpel and others for holding a district road meeting for road district No. 1, for the purpose of levying an additional tax of 5 mills was approved and election called for Friday, Nov. 30, at 9 a.m. at Upper Nehalem.

In the matter of the request of Jim Sutton for duplicate of road warrant No. 35492, for \$63.00 the same having been lost, same was granted on petitioner furnishing the proper security. The other business before the court was compiling the budget for 1918, which appears on another page of this issue.
