Romance and Tragedy of These Unsalted Inland Seas.

A VAST MARINE GRAVEYARD.

No Equal Area of Ocean Waters Has Proved So Great a Glutton For Human Life and Ships and Rich Cargoes-Mysteries of Missing Vessels.

All of the romance of the sea is not contained in the Atlantic or the Pacific. The great lakes are rich in romance. History and thrilling narrative around this enchanted country. Indian tradition clusters thick about it. Three nations struggled for dominion over the lake country-England. France and the United States. Innumerable shipwrecks have contributed their black pages to the story of the inland seas. The thrill of storm at sea, of struggle with the elements in the blackness of a Lake Su perior night, of glorious victory or brave defeat, remains to be recorded fittingly.

What chronicle contains a more fascinating record than the narrative of the voyage of exploration made by Rene Cavalier de la Salle in his good ship the Griffin, the first sailing vessel to venture forth on the great lakes? In 1679 this ship, captained by the intrepid French soldier of fortune and manned by a merry crew of voyagers. with several Jesuit zealots, sailed the length of Lake Erie. Lake St. Clair and Lake Huron on a voyage of adventure and discovery. The Griffin was lost on ts return voyage. La Salle, who had remained in the north country, never the great lakes bad been recorded. Countless others were to follow it. For the great lakes hold their grim record of tragedies.

It is interesting to note that no simflar area of any ocean, if suddenly stripped of its volume of water, would expose to human gaze a larger number of sunken ships or more valuable cargoes than lie at the bottom of these inland waters. A record kept between the years 1878 and 1898 reveals the startwas nearly \$8,000,000.

Some of these vessels disappeared almost as mysteriously as did the Griffin in the brave old days of exploration. No wreckage floated to the shore. The great lakes hid well their secrets. Navigators of the northern lakes insist that there are portions of Lake Superior where it is impossible to find the bottom. The superstition is that some ships that have gone down at sea are

THE RIFLE BARREL

Making It Perfectly Straight Is a Delicate Operation.

Following the reaming operation in rifle manufacture, which leaves the bore of the barrel smooth and polished. comes one of the most delicate and exacting operations in gunmaking, that of straightening the interior of the barrel. In straightening a barrel everything depends on the skill and experience of the operator, for, although machines have been devised to perform this difficult work, they still require skilled men to operate them, and they cannot turn out as much work as is done by hand by the old method that Some day the great lakes are going has been practiced for years and which

The operator places a barrel on a rest and ooks through it at the straightedge on the window, observing the shadow cast by the edge on the polished interior of the bore.

This shadow extends about halfway down the bore, and if the latter is perfectly straight the shadow shows two straight dark lines, one on either side of the bore and slightly below its center. If, however, there is a crook in the bore the lines of the shadow diverge from a straight line and zigzag in various directions as the operator revolves the barrel by hand. This indicates that there are crooks in the barreh. To correctly observe these delicate indications requires unusually perfect sight, and to locate the point and nature of the crook is a matter of long experience and judgment.

When the operator has located a crook he lays the barrel across the bars of his straightening block with the high point of the curve uppermost and strikes it with a heavy hammer made of copper or babbit metal, and great judgment is necessary to know just how heard of it again. The first mystery of hard to strike to remove the crook. This process of observation and straightening is repeated until the two shadow lines are perfectly true for one-half of the length of the barrel and then is repeated for the other half, observations being taken from the opposite end.

Another method of straightening sometimes practiced is by placing in the muzzle of the gun a lens covered with cement, in which a circle is scratched.
