WATER RIGHT IS DISPUTED

Town of Nehalem Asserts H. Schoolmeyer Has Forfeited Priority.

Salem, Ore. Nov. 19.—Representatives of the town of Nehalem today appeared before the Division Superintendent Chincock, of water division No. 1, with a demand that H. Schoolmeyer forfeit his priority right to the water of Bobbs Creek on the ground that the application was not made in good faith and that he has not prosecuted development.

Schoolmeyer secured the right to the water to develop power for domestic purposes, as well as to supply water to a school on his land and for other similar purposes.

The Supreme Court gave Schoolmeyer his priority right. The town contends that its secondary right is insufficient to furnish it an adequate water supply.

THE Y.M.C.A. DRIVE IN TILLAMOOK COUNTY.

Large Number Citizens Contribute \$3,000.00 to the Fund.

In the great campaign which has just been waged during the past week by the Y. M. C. A., for \$35,000,000, for the care of the soldiers of the United States and her allies, Tillamook won credit to herself.

We have exceeded our quota of \$2,000 by almost half, every district in the County exceeding their apportionment, and some about doubling. The banner district in the county was Cloverdale, with an apportionment of \$200, more than doubled, this district having raised \$462.50.

Brighton, apportioned \$200.00, raised \$202.25, led by Tom Watt.
