This was good news to some of our citizens, as there are several Tillamook boys in that regiment. They include Thos Coates, Jr., Art Wallace, Verle Stanley, Harry Ackley, Clifford Jope, Orford Nolan, Jack Olson and Cliff Martin and Shultson.

For the information of the public we wish to say that the money collected in the Red Cross membership drive is divided between the local auxiliaries and the parent organization. This enables the local organizations to obtain money to buy their supplies, or in other words, if you become a member of the Red Cross, 50c. will go to the parent organization and 50c. to the local branch.

B. J. Sperry representing the Paramount and Archaic Pictures corporation of Portland, was in the city Wednesday calling on Partridge and Morrison of the Gem Theatre. We are told that they have signed contracts for the exclusive rights to these high quality pictures, which they will use in their popular photoplay theatre. The Executive Board of the Tillamook Red Cross met on Saturday and made final arrangements for the Christmas Red Cross drive for members, and Rev. Gibson, pastor of the M. E. Church, was invited to meet with the board, for he had signified his willingness to stump the county for the Red Cross. The board planned several meetings in different parts of the county at which Mr. Gibson was to be the principal speaker, and for a united meeting on Sunday evening at the city hall in this city.

After a week of stormy weather, which appeared to have blown itself out on Sunday, with indications of fine weather, a genuine southwest made its debut on Monday with torrential rain. The storm was a repeater of the blow last week only that it blew a little harder and the rain fell with more force, causing high water on all the bottom lands. It was late Monday afternoon when some of the rivers were out of their banks and on Tuesday morning every river in the county was on a rampage. On Wednesday morning the storm had ceased.

Bay City Logging Company vs. E. B. Wickham is a suit filed in circuit court to recover \$250.28. Complaint alleges that on Dec. 11, 1917, plaintiff was indebted to defendant for services rendered in the logging camp in the sum of \$28.86 and no more, and that by mistake the amount 50 due defendant was computed to be \$228.68 and acting upon said mistaken computation plaintiff paid to the defendant that amount of money intending at the time to only pay the amount actually owing the defendant. The plaintiff discovering the mistake demanded from defendant the amount over paid, who refused to do so, and this suit is to recover that amount.

To Stop Car Shortage.

Agent Grate, of the Southern Pacific, says: I am in receipt of information that the Government is requiring railroad companies to make a special report to them of the names of all receivers of carload shipments of freight who do not release the cars within free time allowed. It is not known just what action that the Government is going to take when such names are received, but in view of the severe car shortage, it is felt that action will be taken to place freight cars only for those who load and unload them promptly. In this connection, it is the patriotic duty of every shipper to release each car the day that it is received, both on incoming and outgoing shipments, not delaying loading until last day of free time. The government is being delayed in the prosecution of the war on account of shortage of freight cars.

Co-operate With Red Cross.

In the greatest campaign of its kind ever undertaken the American Red Cross is asking for 10,000,000 new members, and expects to enroll

them between December 16 and December 25.

The magnitude of this drive is commensurate with the magnitude of the need in which it was conceived. We all know the tremendous demands on the good services of the Red Cross at this time. We all know that this demand is going to be vastly greater before it grows less. We all know there is only one way in which the unbounded suffering caused by this war can be alleviated systematically and on a scale proportionate to its extent. That way is through co-operation with the Red Cross.

There are more than 10,000,000 persons in the United States who are not members of the Red Cross largely because of thoughtlessness. Are you one of them? In this drive you may become a member for one dollar. Can you weigh a dollar against the war-created misery and suffering that exists and hesitate an instant.

The Red Cross service flag, indicating the number in the household who are Red Cross members, is already to be seen in thousands of homes. Before Christmas these thousands will grow into millions.

Do you wish your flagless home or office or store or factory to be flanked by Red Cross service flags? If you cannot serve in the trenches you can serve at home.

THE \$50.00 LIBERTY BOND TO BE GIVEN AWAY

By Halton's Monday Evening, Dec. 24—Red Cross Now in the Lead—Who Will Get It?

The Liberty Bond voting contest will close with a whirlwind finish. The result is very much in doubt at this writing. The local Red Cross Society now leads with 325,310 votes and they promise to roll up a vote by Monday exceeding 500,000.

The Honor Guard hold a strong second place with 214,731 votes and thousands more to be cast on Monday. The Rebekahs are in third place with 106,813. On the face of their present standing it would look as though they could not pass the other contestants, but their leaders say "Watch us snow them under with votes Saturday." On that day the Rebekahs are given double votes for all votes cast. They claim they will have between 500,000 and 1,000,000 by the time they are counted Monday evening.

On Monday the day before Xmas, the Red Cross, the Honor Guard and the Rebekahs will be given double votes for all votes cast on that day. The votes will be counted every hour next Monday and a large thermometer will show the result. Everyone is invited to be present to watch the contest. The Bond will be given away Monday evening, Dec. 24th.

The \$100,000,000 War Fund.

What has been done?

Since the war fund became available the Red Cross has sent commissions to France, Russia, Italy, Roumania and Salonica.

The French Commission has a staff of 864 persons, 517 serving without pay.

We are sending supplies to 3,423 French military hospitals.

We serve 30,000 soldiers daily at our canteens in France.

We are caring for thousands of French and Belgian children and refugees.

We have established warehouses in France with a capacity of 100,000 tons.

We have established a sanitarium with 1,000 beds for tuberculosis patients.

We are carrying on extensive relief work in Belgium.

We operate an ambulance service which transports 1,000 refugees a day.

We are carrying on repair work in devastated towns.

We have sent 3,000,000 pounds of milk for Russian babies.

We have given \$1,000,000 to the families of sick and wounded French soldiers.

We have given \$1,000,000 to the British Red Cross.

And we have only just begun.

Two More Tillamook Boys Report to Their Country's Call.

John and Peter Wyss, two of Tillamook's most highly respected young men are willing to do their "bit" for the land of their adoption. They ungrudgingly left their farms, friends and relatives for the navy and for whatever destiny has in store for them.

These two brothers were born near Grindewald, Switzerland, and came to America with their father and his family in 1897. The father died the year following and the mother in 1905 leaving the eleven children to take their own ways in this world as best they could. Through the constant and faithful efforts of a sister, now Mrs. Ben Jacob, the children did not scatter much but remained in the same vicinity.

Upon his arrival in this country Mr. Wyss bought an eighty acre farm on the Wilson river. Through their own earnest and industrious efforts his

boys all became successful dairymen. Gottlieb Wyss has a large farm on hundred and twenty acres of land in the Trask river. Peter owns three Eastern Oregon, and he together with Fred Wyss, had the Fred Mauer place rented. John Wyss owns a farm a few miles south of Tillamook; Ulrich lives with Gottlieb Wyss and Chris Wyss bought the old home place on the Wilson river.

Last Sunday Mrs. Rose Jacob gave a dinner in honor of the two boys going away. All of the family were present; except Mrs. Susan Hauschel, whose husband is one of the foremen in the U. S. Navy Yard at Bremerton, Washington. The other members of the family are, namely: Mrs. Rose Jacob, Mrs. Margaret Becker, Gottlieb, Peter, Chris, John, Fred and Ulrich Wyss, all of Tillamook, and Anna Wyss, of Cloverdale. Alfred Wyss met his untimely death because of a defective bridge in 1909.

Tuesday evening most of the family was again together at Gottlieb Wyss' home where a pleasant evening was spent and a very hearty supper eaten.

Wednesday morning many friends and relatives bade the Wyss boys the last farewell, hoping that all will be well with them and that a world peace will be established before long.

Whereas the American Red Cross, through its President, Honorable Woodrow Wilson, its chairman, Hon. William H. Taft, and the chairman of its war council, Honorable H. P. Davison, has called upon all loyal and patriotic citizens of the United States to affiliate with said organization by taking membership therein, and

Whereas the week of December 17-24 has been designated by the aforesaid as the time for membership affiliation, and

Whereas the State of Oregon has been assigned the quota of 240,000 members, being 30 per cent of its estimated population, and

Whereas to fulfill its quota it is necessary for every man and woman in Oregon to join the American Red Cross,

Therefore, I, R. T. Boals, Mayor of Tillamook do hereby proclaim to all citizens of the city of Tillamook that it is a patriotic duty incumbent upon each and all of them to affiliate with the American Red Cross during the aforesaid week of December 17-24, to the end that the City of Tillamook and the State of Oregon may sustain our beloved nation and the American Red Cross to the full extent required. Every man and woman in Tillamook must become a member of the American Red Cross during the week named to fulfill this patriotic obligation.

This proclamation by me issued on December 12, 1917.
