

## More Pay For Men Working in Ship Yards.

Chief Inspector Magee has sent a telegram to Feeney and Bremer Co., insuring men who work in ship yards an increase in pay to the amount of 10 per cent. The pay roll at the ship yard amounts to \$4,000 a month, and this will be an increase of \$400 for the men.

The telegram is as follows:

"I am directed to inform you that in order to provide a proper stimulas to increasing the output of ships in the ship yards of the Pacific Coast, and in order to encourage men who live at great distances to leave their homes and enter on service in ship yards, the Emergency Fleet Corporation will pay to all the employee's of your yards who are covered by Wage Adjustment Board's decision a war service payment of ten per cent, effective on and after December 15, 1917,, to all who work for six consecutive days in the week, that men prevented from working on account of the elements, physical conditions or any un voidable cause will not be denied the benefits provided under this statement, The payments to be computed on straight time at the mini-

mum rate provided in the adjustment board's award.
