

Red Cross Needs Sweaters and Trench Caps, so Get Busy.

Are you knitting? The Red Cross gives the clearest explanations of how pest to make the things that should be supplied. Below are the Red Cross instructions for the new sweater and

the trench cap: Use khaki-colored or dark gray arn for sailors. Use No. 5 needle for sweater; No. 3 needles for trench

Directions for Sleeveless Jacket

Cast on 80 stitches; knit two, purl two for four inches, and then add one stitch after every fifth stitch until there are 96 stitches. From this point knit every stitch on right side. On wrong side slip one, purl one, slip one, purl one all the way across.

When sweater is 14 inches long bind on last four stitches on each side to reduce width at armhole. Then knit plain first and last six stitches on each


